News from Neroche Hall by Richard Davies

Despite the fact that this winter our weather may have been fairly benign thus far I know that many people, myself included, have succumbed to the unpleasant virus that has done the rounds. I hope that it did not spoil things too much for you if you were you unlucky enough to be affected.

As always a fresh year brings forth another chapter in the life of our hall, with old favourites coming back as well as hopefully some new. In my last newsletter article, I alluded to the possibility of the hall committee exploring the application for a grant to make improvements in



relation to the showing of films. Unfortunately, a review of our 2016 film expenditure indicates a worrying trend of decline in attendance numbers.



It may help if I briefly explain that the hall engages with Moviola, who specialise in rural cinema, to show films at our hall once a month. Moviola produce a list of recently released films from which we select usually three films to be shown over the following three months. We are contracted to pay Moviola a pre-agreed

percentage of the door takings and recent low numbers have meant that certain films have either effectively run at a loss or a marginal profit.

The Committee cannot carry on subsidising films at a loss, for obvious reasons, and we would be loath to continue along that path. Choice of films is always difficult in that we are trying to cater for many tastes and preferences, which is not easy. The film nights will continue for the next three months after which we will again review the situation. But in the meantime I would ask that if you wish to retain this excellent community venture you please vote with your feet and give it your full support.

Some of you will have been disappointed to learn that our Safari Supper Evening in January had to be postponed due to insufficient numbers of tickets being sold. There are probably a number of reasons for this, such as the bugs that have been going around and the closeness to Christmas. Whatever the reasons, we are committed to trying to set a new date that will appeal to more people. There has been some discussion as to the timing and I would be very interested to hear any views on the subject. Would you prefer the event to be in the summer rather than the darker winter evenings for example?

Forthcoming events will, as always, be featured in this Newsletter as well as the hall's website, Parish Magazine and Wally's Alerts, and I am

pleased to confirm that our popular Fish and Chip Quiz Night will go ahead on Friday 17th March. As in the past the fish and chip cart will cook to order on site on the night. Teams should consist of a maximum of six persons only. Due to the popularity of this event we have decided to ask that team captains pre-book their table with me in advance to avoid disappointment.



We hope that you will continue to support events at the hall during 2017 and if you are new to the area please come along and meet some new people. You will always be sure of a warm welcome!

Precept for 2017/18

At the January meeting, the Parish Council discussed its budget and precept requirement for 2017/18.

I am pleased to report that the precept will remain at £4446, despite the reduction in financial support from the District Council. This figure equates to £17.95 p.a. per Band D property.

The Parish Council carefully considers whether items of expenditure are necessary or beneficial to the community and wherever possible looks to source outside funding for major items of expenditure. For example, the Housing Needs Survey carried out last year was completely funded by a Lottery Awards For All grant.

Annual Parish Meeting

The date for the Annual Parish meeting has been set for **Thursday 20th April 2017.**

This meeting is entirely separate from a Parish Council meeting, although some members of the Parish Council help to organise it together with other members of the Parish. There will be presentations on matters of interest to the community and a chance to meet local elected representatives such as the County Councillor and District Councillor. The local MP has attended on previous occasions.

The meeting also provides an opportunity to learn about all the amazing events that regularly take place in the Parish, as many local clubs and organisations are represented. Leaving One's Mark From our Staple Fitzpaine Correspondent

The appellation 'graffiti' is usually conferred with a negative connotation; denoting a painting or carving which essentially says, 'I was here', in a form not appreciated by others. One of the earliest examples of the art survives as the silhouette of a hand on a cave wall in Le Chauvet in southern France. It was created thirty thousand years ago by a tall man who spat a mouthful of red ochre over his extended fingers, and can be seen to this day.

The phrase '*Church graffiti*' conjures up a rather more startling image, in which a 'hoodie' armed with a can of aerosol paint wilfully defaces a revered medieval building. We are more familiar with decorations in the form of carved pew ends and colourful stained glass windows which commemorate the Parish elite; commissioned by those able to afford a professionally manufactured representation. Relatively little evidence of the ordinary local folk who worshipped in our churches remain, or of



the ringers who called them to services. Church graffiti provides a connection to those parishioners; some of whom simply carved a personal mark, others etched designs with for more complex reasons such as protection against demons.

In Staple Fitzpaine, the tower roof of St Peter's Church bears the outlines of shoes and hands belonging to residents from centuries past; one such foot is shown in the photo below. These carvings offer the contemporary observer a conduit, back through time to their originators. These simple, almost childish artefacts assert, '*I was here'*; perhaps

motivated by an instinct not dissimilar to that of the Le Chauvet cave painter.

The outline of a hand can be seen on the roof of the stairwell turret at the top of St Thomas' Church tower in Thurlbear; its exposed location suggests 'I.R.' was untroubled by vertigo. Many other personal epithets survive on the Thurlbear's tower, but most are unfortunately no longer visible due to the capping of the lead by modern felt.

This newsletter does not seek to encourage queues of penknife-bearing parishioners at

the doors of local church towers, or to inspire visitors to attend Wookey Hole Caves, coyly spouting mouthfuls of cochineal. However, if you have 'left your mark' in an interesting location (or left an inscription somewhere to fend off the '*evil eye*'), please write in and let us know.

Update from our County Councillor

Ross Henley writes his regular column. He is the Liberal Democrat member for the Blackdown and Neroche division of Somerset County Council.

I wanted to start with an update about plans to change our black bin collections from fortnightly to once every three weeks from the autumn.

I am a bit concerned about this as it might be an issue for some households with large families. There's also the prospect of it leading to more fly-tipping which sadly affects our rural





areas where a few thoughtless daytrippers decide to dump their rubbish.

I hope I'm proved wrong. Encouragingly, the weekly collection of recyclables will continue, with a promise of a greater collection of plastic products.

Council merger proposed

The proposed merger

between Taunton Deane and West Somerset councils also concerns me. I think it's always hard for our rural voice to be heard in Taunton anyway so to be part of a much larger council could mean a further diminishing influence for our rural area and having to compete for influence and funding with the whole of west Somerset too.

The Secretary of State will make the final decision in the autumn.

Bus service concerns

I have been contacted by several residents about cuts by the county council to the 99 bus service which travels through our area on its way to either Taunton or Chard. Rural bus services are important rural lifeline, especially as not everyone has a car, so it's regrettable that the council is continuing to scale back our bus services.



I noted that the council celebrated saving over £1.5 million on concessionary fares this year - not much to celebrate, I think, as this has only happened because the council's cut in bus services has meant that bus pass holders now can't use the bus pass as much or at all.

Well done WI

On a lighter note, I really enjoyed my visit to the local WI Macmillan



coffee morning at the Greyhound before Christmas. It was for a fantastic cause. I lost my mum last summer to cancer so I always want to support cancer charities. Well done to the WI for all your efforts and fundraising.

I also attended the Neroche villages lunch at the village hall. It was a fantastic

occasion as always with fantastic food and company. There is so much going on at the Neroche Hall. I'm looking forward to the next quiz and its fish and chips.

The covers opened rather like the theatre curtains to reveal the smiling faces of the carol singers. In later years custom and excise duty on diesel prompted a change of vehicle and Alison Brown came to the rescue with her lorry.

Last Christmas twenty singers, accompanied by Julie Pope on the accordion, visited Lady Acre, The Alms Houses and The Manor in Staple Fitzpaine; Pooles Farm and Curland Close in Curland; Barton Oaks in Bickenhall; and last but not least The Greyhound in Staple Fitzpaine. Seasonal refreshments were served at all the stops and a great deal of fun was had by both carol singers and hosts.

The village carol singers have always heralded Christmas and this festive fun is almost unique in rural areas. Thank you carol singers for giving us your gifts of time and music; thank you hosts for all the refreshments; and between everyone £342.50 was raised for the Beacon Centre.

St Peter's Carol Service, Staple Fitzpaine By Mal Lee (Churchwarden)

Advent is a very dark time of year as the nights are at their longest. For Christians it is a time of reflection and growing anticipation as we wait for the light of Jesus to end the darkness. The carol service on 21 December saw the church beautifully decorated with greenery, and candles (owls and cherubs also played a small part in the decorations). Bells rang out to welcome church-goers and candles in jam jars lit the paths. Amongst the 128-strong congregation there was a buzz of anticipation to hear the story of how the birth of Jesus came to pass.

The service was led by Rev Christabel Ager and Phil Albrow. The church lights were dimmed as Christabel read 'What is Christmas'. Then the congregation remained standing and silent as soloist Lottie Michaels movingly sang the first verse of Once in Royal David's City before the lights went up and the congregation all joined in. The story of the birth of Jesus, from traditional bible readings, was extremely well told by Henry Heath, Kath Michaels, Tricia Dryden, Alison Brown, Magnus Stewart and Mal Lee. An intriguing 17th century poem by Thomas Ford was read superbly by John Lee. Lots of people commented on the thought-provoking poem which finishes as follows:

> Thus if the king were coming would we do, And 'twere good reason too; For 'tis a duteous thing To show all honour to an earthly king, And after all our travail and our cost, So he be pleas'd, to think no labour lost.

But at the coming of the King of Heaven All's set at six and seven: We wallow in our sin, Christ cannot find a chamber in the inn. We entertain him always like a stranger, And as at first still lodge him in the manger.

Phil Albrow gave us some 'Thoughts for Christmas', including the lighting of four candles - one for each Sunday in Advent - which reminded him of the Two Ronnies' joke about 'fork 'andles'. He also reminded us that Christmas is about love, children and the birth of a baby who died so that we might have everlasting life.



St Peter's Singers always add an extra dimension to church festival services and this year they were outstanding. Led by conductor and organist Julie Pope, the choir go from strength to strength. The 17 singers delighted the congregation with The Sussex Carol, Lully, Lulla, Lullay and Follow that Wondrous Star.

The congregation's singing was

wonderful as everyone enjoyed the familiar carols of Christmas. Before the final blessing, hand knitted gifts of really lovely snowmen and Christmas stockings, all made by Jenny Stewart, were handed to members of the congregation. This was an act of kindness in the true spirit of Christmas. Afterwards there was a retiring collection for the Christian Aid Aleppo Appeal which came to £266.82 and everyone was invited to enjoy seasonal refreshments. It was a memorable evening.

Christmas Tree Day at Staple Farm

On the 4th of December we were blessed with a beautiful sunny day for our Christmas tree open day at Staple Farm. The trees looked almost redecorated first thing in the morning with a covering of frost over them.

We had a steady stream of families coming to choose their perfect tree direct from the field. This can prove quite a challenge when confronted with several thousand to choose from. After a tree had been



chosen, it was cut down and transported to the customer's car.

Most of the trees will have been growing with us for over 10 years, but some of the larger ones will have been growing for 15 years.



On the day we also had freshly cut trees available in the yard for those families who were short on time. Also in the yard were some warm drinks and mince pies to add to the festive occasion.

We were selling trees right up to late afternoon on Christmas Eve.

We are now starting to prune the trees ready for next year and do this over about 8 weeks in between other jobs.

The Farming Calendar by Daniel Macey

As many of us living in the Parish do not fully comprehend the world of farming, local farmer Daniel Macey has kindly penned a few words to give us an idea as to what he is up to at this time of the year.

Happy New Year everyone. I am writing this on 31st January and so far we have had an exceptionally dry winter period, although the weather has just broken and is becoming damp. The dry weather has helped



us so far this season as the ground in this area can turn very "gooey" when wet. Autumn crops are looking exceptional but if they are not germinated before it turns wet the crop usually suffers and we have significant losses.

Our calving season has gone well. Every year we aim to get about 80 dairy female replacements for the herd, which we are now over and above. The rest of the cows would have had male dairy calves or "beef breds" which are sold to Blade Farming to be reared for beef. We currently have 330 milking cows which are milked twice daily.

The next jobs on the farming calendar will be our spring work which includes making the yearly forage stocks. The farm is 600 acres which is split into thirds, 200 acres of grass, 200 acres of maize and 200 acres of winter wheat. The grass and maize will be used to feed the cows and the winter wheat will be sold off the farm.



In late February/March we will start to apply fertiliser to the grassland and the wheat and begin preparations for drilling maize in April. After maize drilling the grass will have grown and we will aim to take out first cut of silage at the beginning of May - hopefully after having had a nice period

Superfast Broadband on the way, but we may have to wait

Good news - Neroche Parish will be getting the very best type of superfast broadband. But, we may wait up to three years to get it. Meanwhile, there is another option available to those who need faster speed now, though many of us will probably stay with the existing system while waiting.



Superfast Broadband

Lynne Spoors, our lead parish councillor for broadband, reports that the winning bidder for providing superfast broadband to our area, which includes the Blackdown Hills, is **Gigaclear**. The company connects a property directly to the internet by fibre; there is no copper wire line to slow down the speed. The technology, known as fibre to the premises (FTP), is the gold standard and is capable of achieving fantastic speeds. It's the best possible news.



Gigaclear says that it is still working on its roll-out schedule and will not able to give a scheduled connection date for premises until March/April 2017.

The contract must be completed by 2020 so we could wait three years, but at least we will soon know when. You can go to their website, enter your postcode, find your house and register an interest so as to receive updates. There is information on the cost of different packages of usage, and on installation costs.

Of course, those who are happy with their current broadband speed never need to change from the current system which uses telephone lines connected to the local exchange.

An interim way to get faster Broadband and the Voucher Scheme

Lynne Spoors has found an interim way of getting faster broadband until the fibre network arrives. It is particularly useful for those who obtained a £500 Connecting Devon and Somerset voucher to use in this way. Exmoor Technologies can equip premises with a mounted aerial and a router so that they can receive 4G broadband from existing mobile phone masts. The system works in many sites where a mobile phone cannot detect a signal. The one-off installation cost is £548, or £48 for those

with a CDS voucher. For further information go to *www.exmoor-tech.co.uk* and click the CDS Broadband Voucher button. The broadband service



is provided by the mobile phone company EE, which has various monthly packages available, depending on needs and usage. Lynne arranged a public meeting in January in Neroche Hall to allow interested parties to discuss the proposal with Exmoor Technology; details of this are on the Neroche Villages website. I understand that two households in Neroche Parish have already used their voucher with Exmoor Technologies and get a vastly improved broadband speed and performance.

What Now?

Lynne will continue to monitor progress on CDS Broadband Phase 2 roll-out with Gigaclear and Connecting Devon and Somerset, to track progress for our Parish and will report any significant news via the Email Alert, Neroche Villages website and Neroche Villages Newsletter. And it's probably best not to take on a long term contract with a broadband provider until the time frame for the fibre broadband is clarified.

Many people have been absolutely PESTERED by nuisance phone calls recently - up to 8 in a day. From memory, the call can go like this ...

"This is an important announcement for people on benefits. Did you know that people on benefits can have their boiler replaced for free? Press 2

to be connected to a case worker, or 9 if you do not want to receive any calls "

Is anyone else suffering in the same way?

I have had so many calls like this - all seem to come from different numbers when I do 1471, but are an STD code and a 5 digit number, whereas most phone numbers are 6 digits these days.

I have reported the problem to the Information Commissioner's Office tel: 0303 123 1113 or www.ico.org.uk/for-the-public/nuisance-calls/

I would urge everyone to report any nuisance calls by phone or online at the ICO website. Each complaint has to be done individually, but it does not take long. If the ICO get enough numbers logged they can trace the fraudsters and put a stop to this criminal activity.

If you know someone who is not online, why not help them to log these nuisance calls? Also, check they are registered with the Telephone Preference Service, 0345 07 0707. This is a free service, which can also cover mobile phones.

Rebecca's Round-up By Rebecca Pow MP



The year began with all the demands that triggering Article 50 entailed, with no let-up in related activities subsequently. Similarly, the new incumbent at the White House in the U.S. has brought plenty of food for thought.

My priority locally continues to be ensuring that Taunton Deane is at the forefront of all that I do, fighting our corner and endeavouring to get the best for our area.

One success, in which I have played my part together with dedicated input from Taunton Deane Council, has been securing Green Town status for Taunton, one of only three towns in the country to gain this status. Whilst this will not solve all the issues that are inevitably associated with proposed new housing developments in the area, the allocated funding (£350,000) will help towards a more sustainable future and will make it possible to bid for other funds with which to build essential infrastructure and facilities.

Regional Emphasis

I am working increasingly with colleagues in the region to gain the South West the attention it needs to raise productivity and growth levels here. Sadly decades of underinvestment in the region, have taken their toll and I am working to address this.

To this end I was delighted to get a Prime Minister's Question in (all that 'bobbing' up and down was worth it) on this very subject. I cited the recent takeover of excellent local business, The Ministry of Cake, by a successful French company, as an example of how outside companies are viewing the South West as a good place in which to invest. Our SW MPs group is emphasising the importance of developing the infrastructure framework that will allow



business to thrive. This includes road, rail and a suitable digital infrastructure.

I am delighted that Secretary of State for Transport, Chris Grayling has reconfirmed his commitment to the upgrade of the A358. I'm aware that



some members of Neroche Parish Council have already had some interaction with Highways England and with government funding for the Taunton Rail transformation project signed off. GWR need to move ahead with their side of the bargain.

With 85% of businesses in the SW being micro businesses (employing 0-9 people) and many based in rural areas, adequate digital connection is essential. The recent signing of one final phases of Connecting Devon and Somerset's' super-fast broadband programme by Gigaclear, should deliver this essential service to thousands of additional households and businesses by 2019 providing speeds up to 33 times faster than the UK average.

Skills are another key to progress and I am continuing to highlight the benefits of the government apprenticeship schemes which are becoming more focused to deliver what business wants. The prospect of a University of Somerset here at the Bridgwater and Taunton University Centre is also edging forward.

Fairer Funding

Many of you will have signed my petition calling for fairer funding for our schools. Historically, pupils in this area have received on average £2000

less per pupil than the average for the country with rural areas being particularly hard hit. Having campaigned long and hard on this, together with thousands of local parents and teachers I am pleased that after consulting widely the government has proposed a fairer system. This means that on average Somerset schools will receive 4.5% more funding. There are still some anomalies to iron out, and there will be a few losers but on the whole this should benefit our children and help our hard working teachers.

Cultural Opportunities

I am always mindful that having a great cultural offer is as important as getting the economy on a firm footing. ArtsTaunton, of which I am a patron, is focusing on exactly this. A specific aim is to create a top class arts venue in the county town building on



existing strengths, such as the Brewhouse. Securing Creech Barrow Hill (behind the Hydrographic) as the location for an eye catching piece of sculpture, visible to all entering the town, is another ArtsTaunton ambition with a completion being staged to choose the artist. Already up and running is the biennial Somerset Song Prize a high calibre national competition placing a special importance on the relationship between the singer and their pianist. I much enjoyed the launch and look forward to the final which is to be staged at Queens College.

Let's not forget the enjoyment we get from touring theatre companies that perform in many of our local village halls together with much entertainment communities generate themselves, including pantos and Wassailing events. Many people turned out to resurrect the Stoke St Mary wassail. This ancient tradition of blessing the apple trees came complete with the singing of original Somerset wassailing songs (care of Tom Mayberry, of the Somerset Heritage Museum), hanging burnt toast in the trees for the robins, firing a shotgun and, of course, the quaffing of copious quantities of cider.

Helping The Homeless

In Parliament, as a Parliamentary Private Secretary in the Department of Communities and Local Government, I have been increasingly involved in the legislative side of business, which after all is the key role of government. I have been on the committee to enable the National Citizen Service to receive Royal Assent, putting it on a firm footing that will enable thousands of 15 – 17 year olds to take part in this excellent community programme. Students gain skills, confidence and contribute to society, all of which should benefit them in later life as well as benefiting our communities. For more details visit: *www.ncsyes.co.uk*

I was also proud to be part of the Committee working on my colleague Bob Blackman's Private Members Bill to reduce homelessness. Sadly homelessness is all too common in Taunton and the surrounding area, and even one rough sleeper or homeless person is one too many. Many volunteers and charities locally already do excellent work to help those in this unfortunate position but this Bill, backed by funding of £48m, should go some way to helping further. It ensures all homeless people can access meaningful support to resolve their homelessness, whilst introducing measures to prevent people becoming homeless in the first place.

The Bill (which has passed its third reading in the Commons and goes to the Lords) had cross party support and really constructive input from local government, housing associations, and charities including Shelter and Crisis. It's good news.

Representing

I spend much time meeting with Ministers on an individual basis to feed in ideas from constituents, on all manner of subjects, whether it be calling for the dermatology department at Musgrove hospital to remain open, for understand of the demands on nurses and GPs, for the right climate for our farmers to thrive in the post EU world and much more besides. In addition, whenever I can, I speak in relevant debates on such diverse topics as: Violence against girls and women; the rural economy and exiting the EU; a complete ban on elephant ivory; and a call for the right digital platforms to enable small, local and community radio station, like Tone fm and 10Radio in Wiveliscombe to be able to transmit digitally without prohibitive cost. Life is very varied with never a dull moment. My door is always open should you need to contact me.

Neroche Local History Group Visit to the Somerset Heritage Centre By Jane Hole



A small group of amateur researchers recently visited the Somerset Centre Heritage in Taunton. It was a first visit for some and a return one for several of There us. is alwavs something new to find out, different sources, documents. maps. censuses and so on.

The ever-helpful staff showed us how to access the many resources available, from the old fashioned microfiche, through to online articles, maps and pictures. The extensive archive has documents from the medieval period through to the present day. In fact one of the real treasures of the archive is much earlier than the medieval - it is a Charter signed by King Ina of Wessex dating back to the early 700s.

We were researching a variety of themes, which the Centre was able to help with, including:

- A history of a local house
- A special window in a local church
- The ongoing quest to find more about the 'Lost Houses' of our villages
- Kelly's Directory for the villages
- Village information in the 'History and Antiquities of the County of Somerset' by Rev John Collinson printed in 1791
- The Sanfords of Nynhead and their relationship to our villages

During my research on the Lost Houses of our villages I was referred to the 1910 Inland Revenue record. It is a great document for anyone

researching on local houses because it confirms many details: christian and surname of occupier and owner, a description, a street number place or house name, estimated extent, gross annual value and rateable value.

The Duties on Land Values from the Inland Revenue 1910: page 6 of the record for the parish of Curland

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Using our house as an example, the page above shows the number 67 of the assessment, giving the following details:

It was occupied by James Pinney, was owned by A. Shire, was a house with land, the house name was Alfords, there were 18 acres of land, its gross annual value was £31, the rateable value was £22 and 10 shillings (if only....).

Legal Blow for Crown Estate in Landmark Case

Some of you may have spotted a story in The Times newspaper just before Christmas. It was reported that, after a prolonged legal case, Ian and Judith Wakley of Staple Park Farm had been awarded substantial

compensation "in a landmark case that strikes a blow for thousands who are tenants of the Crown Estate."

The Times says that lan and Judith moved from Aberdeen to Somerset "only to find that the condition of the farm they were



renting had been significantly misrepresented."

The newspaper went on to report that "the couple were persuaded to take on the tenancy of the farm in 2007 after being told that the parlour and the slurry/dirty water storage and disposal were "right up to date", Oliver Radley-Gardner, their lawyer, said.

In addition they were told that the farm had an effective freshwater supply and distribution system.

But none of that turned out to be true, he said. Silage on the farm, which the Wakleys had to purchase when they took over and was said to be of a "high quality", turned out to be contaminated with wire, which caused cattle to become seriously ill and die.

The judge decided in the couple's favour, finding that there had been multiple tenancy breaches and misrepresentations by their landlord, said The Times. The Crown Estate was expected to seek leave to appeal. It's been a busy and challenging time for the Crown Estate and its tenants in Neroche and the surrounding area. Separately, readers will remember the recent travails of the 'Forced Out Action Group' and concerns over the treatment of tenants being evicted from properties in the area.

Fact or fiction?

As a footnote, readers might be interested to know that the Crown Estate website states that "we are a business driven by a strong set of values (Commercialism, Integrity & Stewardship). We mean them, we are proud of them and we are respected for them by the people we work with and in the wider community."

The Crown Estate's vision is "to be the UK's most respected property business."

Taunton Deane Borough Council News

John Williams, Borough Councillor, Neroche Ward and Leader of the Council.

I write regarding a number of topical issues:

Creating a New Council Covering the TDBC and WSC Geographical Area

The proposal is to form a single new council that will replace both Taunton Deane and West Somerset Council by April 2019. If this proposal is adopted it will not affect or change Somerset County Council and existing towns and Parishes remain unchanged. What will change is the ward boundaries for elected Councillors. These will be



reviewed by the Boundary Commission with a view to reducing the number of Councillors from 84 at present to around 53, but this will be subject to recommendations from the Boundary Commission.

These proposed changes are about reducing the cost of administration and back office costs so we can continue, in the face of inevitable reduction in Government grant funding, delivering virtually all the services that we know you as the community so value. It is all about working more efficiently, but maintaining most of the services we deliver now.

This has not just arisen. West Somerset first approached TDBC in 2012 as they realised then they were too small to remain viable and we considered joint working which had the potential to deliver savings for Taunton Deane as well allowing us to continue investing in growth and development. A business case was prepared which showed savings of $\pounds 1.8$ million per annum across both Councils. This was first implemented in 2013 so we have had three years of operation as the "one officer

team" across both Councils and the £1.8 million per annum has been achieved since then. This gives us confidence that the business case was sound and predicted savings are achievable for when we look at the next steps as we are now.

At that stage it was a commitment that the two Councils remained democratically separate and that there would be no cross subsidisation of costs either way. This was and remains the case.

In 2016 in the face of ever reducing grant funding from central Government, over 40% since 2012 and continuing down, we considered alternative ways of working that again delivered a similar level of services for our community in a more economical and efficient manner. Both Councils concluded that the most efficient way forward was to form one new single Council based on the geographical area of the two Councils. The business case for this indicates a £3.1 million saving per annum, which based on present Government funding forecasts, it allows the new Council to remain viable into the future.

At the time of writing this full consultation is being carried out in both Council areas and the results, along with the proposed business case and democratic arrangements, will be submitted to the Secretary of State, DCLG, for a final decision. It is planned to submit our application by late March and the S of S decision is anticipated by late 2017. If our proposals are approved it is intended the new Council will be elected in the 2019 elections and operational from that date.

As your Borough Councillor I will be very disappointed if, from these changes, you notice any significant difference in the level of services delivered but what it does do is save substantial amounts in management and administrative costs so funding can be re-directed to the front line services.

Recently Awarded Garden Town Status to Taunton

This is a tremendous achievement for Taunton as it, not only confirms Taunton as an area of strategic growth that is delivering much needed homes and jobs, but also provides us with grant funding of £350,000 to properly plan and develop well designed homes with good connectivity ensuring we maintain vital travel links from the town centre to the surrounding countryside, the green lung linking town and country. For those that I know are concerned at the possibility, it does not include any additional housing to that planned already, our last Local Plan, painstakingly finalised in 2012, still determines housing numbers and Garden Town Status does not increase this. Associated with that plan was a review of all the essential services to support the level of new housing planned and of course we continue to work with the various service providers but as housing numbers are not increasing this should not unduly impact on the development planned.

Improvements to the existing roads and transport networks are recognised as being key to any successful development and every effort is being made to bring improvements forward. Key to this is investment in our roads, buses, train station, footpaths and cycleways. Some of these are being progressed such as the NIDR, upgrade of J25 on the M5, dualling of the A358 from Ilminster to J25 including a much needed bypass for Henlade, the Rail Station alterations and Western Relief Road to ease traffic at the Creech Castle junction on Toneway. Much is planned but there's still much more to do.

Finally, flooding is a major concern relating to new housing development. I can offer reassurance that all new development now has to incorporate "sustainable urban drainage" requirements. This means in Taunton Deane we expect the storm water drainage to be designed to reduce the rate of flow into our waterways by 20% when compared to the previous run off rate of the land. Hence we ensure we improve the situation, not worsen it.

A358 Upgrade Southfields, Ilminster to J25 of the M5

I appreciate there is much scepticism about the current plans to deliver this much needed road improvement. It has been "talked about", I am told, since 1948, so I am aware of several false starts! However, I believe that this time it really is going to be achieved and the promise of a start on site in 2020 is still confirmed as the commencement of work. Options for consideration and comments before the final design is prepared should be available shortly.

Highways England have already been carrying out considerable surveys to identify how side roads and rights of way are being used. They have

also started ecological surveys to establish any real constraints on their proposals. All good preparatory work for what will be a major project. Eventually it should cover construction of a new dual carriageway from the A303 at Ilminster to link to the M5 at or near J25 and including a much needed bypass for Henlade. I say much needed because at present the A358 carries traffic at the rate of around 30,000 vehicle movements per day when it has been designed for around 18,000. From this it is obvious that improvement is needed to reduce noise, congestion and worst of all, pollution for those so badly affected.

Superfast broadband Planned Installation Programme

When checking availability on my own home postcode on the Gigaclear web site (*www.gigaclear.com/postcode-checker*) the following came up which I thought I would share;



Congratulations, Gigaclear and Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) are working together to bring the UK's fastest broadband to your community. Gigaclear will be installing a new, pure fibre-to-the-premises broadband network in your area over the next 3 years bringing speeds from 50Mbps up to 1000Mbps to properties in the area. Currently, Gigaclear and CDS are finalising the coverage area and the rollout schedule which should be confirmed during March/April 2017. In the meantime, you may register your interest by clicking the button below. This does not commit you to anything it just allows Gigaclear, who will be building the network, to keep you informed on progress with the rollout.


Other events included a Christmas-themed Craft Day at Long Sutton, and the Cerdic Group Carol Concert at Horton Church. The Somerset County Federation Carol Festival was held in Wells Cathedral, a wonderful venue with excellent singing by the choir and soloists. To start the year off in a competitive mood some of us attended the tenpin bowling competition at the Hollywood Bowl in Taunton. Although we did not win we had some excellent coaching from ex-league player Pauline and enjoyed meeting other WI members from around Somerset.

Our first speaker for the new year was Rod Sinclair. He gave us an excellent powerpoint presentation with a short film on the 'Blood Bikers' know as Freewheelers.

These are highly-trained motorcyclists from many walks of life, who support this charity, founded in 1990 and run entirely by volunteers. They deliver a FREE service to the NHS and the wider community within Somerset, Bristol, Bath, West Wiltshire, and South Gloucestershire, they are one of a number of groups that cover almost the entire country.

Freewheelers operate a fleet of motorcycles each equipped with high-visibility markings, blue lights and sirens for emergency use, purchased by donations and sponsorship.

They run their service from



They transport blood, pathology and microbiology specimens, patient notes, X-rays, breast milk, and other medical supplies. The Freewheelers also work with both the Great Western Air Ambulance and the Wiltshire

Air Ambulance, delivering fresh whole bloods to both organisations every night, returning any unused bloods to the Southmead Hospital blood bank.

At our January meeting we also discussed the loss of the telephone box at Curland Green. The installation of this box was due to the lobbying of our WI and we are very sad to see it go, but we hope to mark its loss with some sort of memorial in the future.

Neroche Housing Needs Survey - Results

Thank you to those who responded to the Housing Needs Survey, which aimed to capture views on what kind of community we'd like to be and how future housing requirements can best be met.

Who responded and what kind of homes do they have?

- 62 people, representing 111 household members
- 22% response rate, from 1 in 5 parishioners
- Nearly 3 in 4 respondents have lived in the parish for over 15 years (73%).
- 1 in 3 are between 45-64 years old and almost a quarter are 65-74 years old
- Most live in a two person household (65%). And although 1 in 5 are two parent families, further analysis shows that just 1 in 10 are families with children aged 15 or under (10%).
- Over 4 in 5 respondents live in 3+ bed properties (80%), and two thirds of these homes have 2 occupants or less (69% 27 homes).

Report headlines

- Over 4 in 5 respondents would support future development if it met the specific needs of Neroche parishioners or those with a genuine local connection. Nearly 2 in 3 people feel 3 bedroom homes are needed the most, although a similar number also see a need for small homes as well (up to 2 bed).
- Those with a view on the **tenure of houses** felt the greatest need in Neroche parish was for affordable homes to rent (77%). Additionally around 1 in 3 feel there is a need for shared ownership housing association homes.
- New homes built on small sites of 10 or fewer homes would be supported by the majority (67%). Conversion of existing buildings, to a lesser extent, would also receive the support of the majority (57%). There is no support for large development sites (+ 20 homes).

- Staple Fitzpaine was preferred location for affordable housing
- The majority of **people have concerns** about future development (60% 37 people). Emerging themes are:
- changes to the rural character of the parish and its villages
- current lack of affordable housing in the parish
- new affordable development would fail to address the real needs of local people, and that social diversity will be lost if the needs of younger families, or lower income groups are not met
- Additionally, comments were made regarding the lack of infrastructure, amenities and services to support new residents
- 8 residents would be interested in **moving to a purpose-built** or converted older people's home in the next 10 years
- 8 households indicated **a need for affordable housing** in the next 5 years. 6 people are seeking Local Authority rental housing.

The survey results will be the subject of further consultation and discussion at the Annual Parish Meeting in April.
