The Olympic Flame will be coming to Taunton and Ilminster on the 21st and 22nd May 2012. It is scheduled to leave Heron Drive just after 6pm and be carried by a relay of torch-bearers to Taunton County Cricket Club. There will be an evening celebration at the cricket ground (details still to be announced).

The torch will stay in Taunton overnight on the 21st May before being carried

(at just after 6am on the 22nd May) by torch-bearers from Somerset Square to Priory Avenue. The journey will continue (by convoy) to Ilminster where it will be carried by torch bearers from Home Farm Way (just before 7am) to Summerland Park Drive. It will then continue its journey by convoy to Yeovil.

# The Neroche Local History Group

The Neroche Local History Group was founded in the summer of 2007 on the initiative of Jane Hole of Curland. From the beginning, it was decided to have a programme including invited speakers and reports from our members on their research.

Early on we were fortunate to be able to explore Perry Hall Farm at Staple Fitzpaine, between tenancies, under the guidance of Dr. Richard Brunning. Tanya James, Community History Officer for the Neroche Project, encouraged our research and gave constant support. Also, in



those early days, Ted Rooke spoke about living in Britty Farm in Neroche Forest as a child in the 1930s. Our group surveyed the now derelict farm and it's buildings. It was



then possible to produce a detailed plan of the farmstead. This work was subsequently a basis for a chapter in the book 'Along The Wild Edge' published as part of the Neroche Project.

Another part of the Neroche Project was an

archaeological dig carried out on the site of the deserted Plaistreet Village in Bickenhall; our members assisted in the trenches and with pot washing. In the following spring an exhibition was mounted by Tanya James at Neroche Parish Hall. We also helped with geophysical surveys at Plaistreet and at Castle Neroche.



Our programme of talks has included: Taunton's Almshouses and Charities

by Jean Allgrove; the Portman Family by Tom Mayberry; the Poor Laws by David Hawkins; and An Iron Age Settlement at Blackbrook by Steve Home-grown contributions have Membury. covered: Village Friendly Societies: The Almshouses at Staple Fitzpaine; Local Deer Parks; A History of Curland and Staple Fitzpaine; Schools, Taxation and Censuses; and lots more!

What of our future plans? We are arranging to record memories of villagers who were young in the middle of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century; much changed in those days. Today more opportunities are





available to villagers and living has, in many ways, become easier. However, there have been losses, for example: we no longer have a village shop and post office in Curland; the village school at Staple Fitzpaine has closed and children as young as 4 years now go by bus to Thurlbear; dairv farming has almost disappeared in the locality; and very few people are employed in farming today.

We look ahead to many more opportunities for historical research chronicling the constant changes to which rural life has been subjected in our villages. All the villages in the shadow of the Blackdowns appear on a map of Somerset commissioned for Queen Elizabeth 1st.

# Interview with Colin Croad - Neroche Hall Fish'n'Chips Quizmaster

#### Q. When and why did the quiz start?

**A.** When I first became Chair of Neroche Hall in 2001, we had a brain-storming session on fundraising and I suggested a quiz. We didn't want all the committee and helpers cooking food, serving and washing up; we wanted them taking part in the Quiz. We hit on the idea of fish and chips, purchased locally.

#### Q. Who was the first quizmaster?

A. Mike Michaels was already running a regular quiz at The Greyhound and as he was previously our Treasurer, we invited him to become quizmaster. He was a great success and we were well-supported. Memorably, on one occasion, when

his recording equipment failed, he whistled various pieces of music which we then had to recognise.

#### Q. How did you become the quizmaster?

**A.** Mike couldn't make a particular quiz night due to the demands of his job in General Practice. I volunteered to take over as I had previously organised an annual quiz in South London to raise money for Save the Children Fund. It was that experience which demonstrated what a great fundraiser a quiz can be.





# *Q.* How would you define a good quiz?

**A.** A good quiz is one where every team scores at least 5 or 6 out of 10 in most rounds. To achieve this you need a wide range of subjects and questions. I always try to frustrate previous winning teams so they don't carry off the prizes every time.

- Q. How often are the Fish'n'Chips quizzes held?
- A. We now hold the quiz twice a year, in early Spring and Autumn.
- Q. Where do you get the questions?

**A.** The questions come from a range of sources. For a couple of months I make notes of various scraps of information in the papers or on television. 'Pointless' has some good questions and so do 'Eggheads' and 'Mastermind'. I always try to verify answers with the help of the Internet.

#### Q. What happens to the quiz profits?

A. All monies raised go towards the Village Hall general fund; hopefully we will soon invest in comfortable and upholstered stacking chairs. As we need at least 100, such a purchase will cost us over £3,000. We now make about £300 on each quiz evening so in over 6 years since I have been running the quiz, they must have made around £4,000.

#### Q. Who organises and runs the quiz night?

**A.** The quiz is very much my baby - I set the questions, put out the road noticeboards and flyers, my wife keeps the scores. I also buy the prizes and we



try to ensure we have decent wines and chocolates (this last quiz for instance, we spent £35 on prizes). John Lee, our last Chair, was particularly keen for the prizewinners to have something worth taking home.

The fish and chips are a combined effort from Richard Davies, Graham Glasper and Nicky Baxter. Every function normally involves all the committee members but it is much better if one person is responsible

for pulling it altogether.

Q. When is the next quiz?

**A.** The next quiz is on **Friday 5th October**, which I have just realised is my wedding anniversary! How did that happen?

The 17th February quiz was a great success. Thanks as always to Colin Croad, our superb quiz master who never fails to expand our knowledge, and also to Pat Croad who looks after the scoring.

# **GODDARDS ORCHARD OPEN DAY**

Goddards Orchard's garden, situated at the rear of the Greyhound Inn, is open on 24<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> June 2012 under the National Garden Scheme. As well as the flower garden there is a woodland area with stream and meadow for fun as well as the vegetable growing area. Tea and cakes will be served and there will be plants for sale. Dogs are welcome on leads.

The NGS has its 85<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year with over 3,000 open gardens across England and Wales. In the past 10 years they have donated 22 million pounds for nursing, caring and gardening charities. These include Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie Cancer Care and Hospices. Brian and Dianne Hood have been persuaded to open Goddards Orchard's garden to the public this year and hope to raise lots of money for these caring charities. All entry fees will go to the NGS, the profit from teas



will be shared between the NGS and St Peter's Church in Staple Fitzpaine.

Brian and Dianne Hood bought Goddards Orchard from the Crown Estate in 1990 when it was just a barn for conversion plus over half an acre of farmyard, old orchard and field. Over the years the land has evolved into a cottage-style garden with narrow pathways, steps, island beds and ponds.

The adjoining woodland garden encourages all types of wildlife and the stream runs through. Log piles offer winter homes to many creatures and the natural flora is encouraged, including nettles for the butterflies!

Recently the adjoining field has become an area where Brian is growing vegetables, in fact so successful that they have been putting out their surplus for sale at the farm gate. Brian grows his vegetables in a traditional way and his hobby of cider making and beekeeping means that there is always cider and honey available for sale, along with vegetables when in season.

# Neroche Parish Council – New Chairman



Jonathan Bell will take over from Marianne Bray as Parish Council Chair at the next meeting, which is the second Thursday in May. Marianne's final duty will be to chair the Annual Parish Meeting on 3rd of May



2012. Jonathan has been a parish councillor, representing Staple Fitzpaine, for about ten years.

The chair normally holds office for two years, often preceded by two years as vice chair. However, as there is a regular turnover of councillors, this pattern is often disrupted. There is usually a rotation of the chair between the four parishes and it was actually Bickenhall's turn to provide the new chair but, on this occasion, it was agreed to advance the rotation by one position (and Jonathan volunteered!).

The main duties are to chair the bi-monthly meetings, set the agenda with the Parish Clerk and check the minutes. However, there is also an important function as a figurehead for the council, should the need arise. The chair is the initial point of contact for both parishioners and for outside agencies.

#### Jonathan's comments -

There has been a lot of activity in the parish in the last year or two, largely in relation to the parish plan which I hope will be a big help in the changing times to come. It has certainly been good to see so much interest in local issues from so many people and I hope this will continue. It will also be good to have strong local support for making this a vibrant community. I'm sure the parish council will do what we can to facilitate this, although our powers are, in practice, limited. In national terms we are a small council and unlikely to take on any new powers arising from the drive towards localism. We will, of course, continue to work closely with our district and county councillors, who kindly give up their time to attend most of our meetings.

On a personal note, my wife and I have lived in the village for nineteen years, having previously lived in Wellington. We have many local friends and try to take a full part in the life of the village.

I look forward to what I hope will be a successful term as Neroche Parish council chair.

**THE ARTISAN BAKER (the 'one and only' bakery in Neroche Villages).** Healthy additive-free bread freshly baked at the Park Farmhouse 'Micro Bakery' in Bickenhall.

If you have recently driven along the road where the Neroche Parish Hall is sited, you will have noticed the rustic signboards inviting you to call in to buy freshly baked bread. A 'ramblers' dream after a long walk, or perhaps if you are driving home from the School run and fancy something nice for lunch.

Frank Heuff, 'The Artisan Baker' at Park Farmhouse, Bickenhall has managed to fulfil his life-long ambition by beginning a hobby-cum-home business to bake quality additive-free bread. He noticed the absence of a rural bakery and, being Dutch, decided to offer bread on a small scale to those who appreciate good food. The response has been amazing – even the odd cyclist will call in on a Saturday to re-fuel with a croissant or two!

Those who attended the Christmas Fayre will remember Frank's products sold out completely and provided a launch pad for his business that has continued to grow by word of mouth.



The Artisan Baker only uses Organic flour, sourced from Shipton Mill in the heart of the Cotswolds just outside Tetbury (which is



by appointment to HRH The Prince of Wales). Current specialities include: Granary cob, Pain de Campagne, Focaccia bread, Sour-dough, French stick and Pain au raisin plus delicious mouth-wateringly good Croissants (made with genuine French butter and French flour). Bread boxes

are also available to order, delivered for free to the local area.

# NEROCHE LITTER ACTION GROUP

The latest 'litter pick-up' took place on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> March and concentrated on the road from Staple Hill to Orchard Portman. The group adopt a commonsense approach to the safety aspects of litter picking on this busy road, by enlisting the help of the local Police Community Support Officer (Lynsey Gamblin) to put out the appropriate signs and generally monitor the operation. Viridor Waste Management also help by providing high-visibility jackets, gloves, pick-up grabbers (as modelled by Margaret

Robinson in the photograph) and waste collection sacks.

The action group and other volunteers met at The Greyhound at Staple Fitzpaine at 10:00 and the road was divided into segments, identified by markers, each segment being allocated to a part of the group. (Some of the



connecting roads are included in the exercise if there are sufficient helpers and time).

On this litter pick a resident of Curland worked on the stretch of road from the village to Crossways Farm. Three residents of Orchard Portman undertook their stretch and the rest of the road was covered by thirteen



helpers in 6 segments. Ideally a few more helpers would have been welcome as with only two per segment it was a busy time for all.

However, on the day, the largest amount of any 'litter pick-up' to date was recovered and the collection truck provided by Anthony & Alison Brown could not manage it all in one run. Approximately 25 large plastic sacks of

litter was recovered together with large amounts of car bumper parts, bits of numbers plates and wing mirrors; there were also 4 traffic cones and some plastic 5 gallon drums. The general litter included the usual plastic bags and bottles, glass bottles, various drinking containers, crisp bags, paper bags, fish& chip/burger/fried chicken boxes, newsprint, drink cans, cigarette packets and the odd boots/shoes. The most unusual item was a kettle, unlike a previous exercise when a microwave oven was extracted from a hedge. Orchard Portman litter appeared to be more up market with a number of Champagne bottles recovered; something to do with a successful day at the racecourse perhaps? The litter pick ended at 13:00, slightly later than the planned 12:15.

The Litter Action Group's Aim is to keep our area free from rubbish and maintain the AONB status. Well done to all those who turned out on the day.

# NEWS FROM NEROCHE FOREST

#### Neroche and the Forestry Commission

As local people know, the Neroche Forest has had a high profile in the last few years as a good example of a multi-purpose forest, offering recreation and social benefits to the community, while also becoming richer in wildlife and continuing to grow timber.

The Forestry Commission (FC), like other Government agencies, has had to make substantial savings in its running costs and, as a result, staffing and administrative structures have changed. Locally, this means that the Neroche Forest now forms part of an enlarged forest 'Beat', covering the Blackdowns, East Devon, West Somerset and the Quantocks. The new Beat Forester for the area is Nick Salter, who is based on the Quantocks. Meanwhile, Brian Turley remains as the local ranger based at Mount Fancy, albeit now covering a larger patch.

Inevitably these changes mean that FC staff will be thinner on the ground, with a larger workload. We must ask you to bear with us if this causes any delays in dealing with issues or answering enquiries. For emergency matters to do with the forest, you should contact Brian Turley on 07769 671105 or Gavin Saunders on 07760 355009. Despite this squeeze, however, there remains much to report about the positive things happening at Neroche.

#### Young Wood

After many years of running activities for volunteers, families and school groups in the Neroche Forest,

staff at the Forestry Commission and local people are now focusing much of their efforts on creating a new, permanent base for these activities at Young Wood, which forms part of the forest east of Wych Lodge. This winter we have begun modest а



programme of coppicing, cutting some of the overgrown hazel on the rides, and generating firewood, poles and pea sticks in the process. Alongside this, we've had a wide variety of groups visit the wood, including our regular volunteers helping with the coppicing, family groups from Taunton coming for family play sessions, and members of the public doing training courses.

Meanwhile, we have regular volunteer days at Young Wood, doing a variety of work, on the fourth Wednesday of each month. These days are open to all, with tools and instruction provided, but please book a place in advance by calling the number below. #### Herepath

A major upgrade of part of the Herepath is due to take place in the April and May. The stretch of bridleway between Staple Lawns and Staple Park Farm will be being surfaced and partly re-routed to improve this previously muddy section. If you use the trail please look out for notices about temporary diversions.

#### Longhorn cattle in the forest

The cattle return to the forest in early May. The herd is now split between two graziers – John & Jo Binnie at Ruttersleigh Farm, and Russell &

Becky Batchelor at Churchstanton. The Binnies' animals will graze the Ruttersleigh and Staple Common part of the forest, while the Batchelors' part of the herd will be at Wych Lodge, Mount Fancy and Staple Hill. As ever, local people should be assured that access to the forest is not affected by the presence of the cattle. However, the animals should be treated with respect and dogs should be kept on leads when passing by the herd. Any suspicious behaviour near the cattle should be reported immediately to 01823 680846.
