

BBC Art Competition - Local Winner



Amateur artist, Lucy Howard from Staple Fitzpaine, has been crowned the '2013 Art Competition' winner of the BBC TV programme 'The One Show'.

Rolling Stone Ronnie Wood, who, as well as being a musician, is an established and successful artist, chose Lucy's 'Cream Tea' picture as the winner from the four finalists in the studio and said that Lucy was a national gem.

Interview with Lucy Howard (by Alan Perrior)

Q. How and when did you enter the competition?

A. One evening, in July, I was watching The One Show with my children and

saw the piece about the competition. Amateur artists across the UK were invited to enter a drawing or picture on the theme 'Where I Live' and I thought my picture 'Bloomin' Roast' (which shows me in frantic cooking mode) fitted the brief perfectly.

The initial 700 entries were whittled down to 24 pictures, these were then judged by a panel of professional artists and a curator of the national portrait gallery. The judges chose four finalists and gave them a further brief on the theme of 'British Summertime'.



I decided to paint a 'Cream Tea' picture using my husband and daughter as models. I was a bit worried as we were only given a week, which is not a long time to do a painting, especially in the summer holidays with the children at home.

The final four pictures were then judged again and Ronnie Wood picked mine, as the overall winner, live on the TV show.

Q. What's happened since the TV show?

A. After the show both pictures 'Bloomin' Roast' and 'Cream Tea' were exhibited at Salford Quays in Manchester.

I've had many requests for prints of the two pictures in the competition so I am getting prints made of these. I have approached art galleries in Taunton



and Ilminster, with the view to exhibiting soon. I am working on a website and already have a facebook page Lucy Howard Art, facebook.com/www.lucyhowardart.org.

Q. How long have you been painting and what inspires your work?

A. I have always drawn and painted but have only been painting seriously since January this year. I paint in acrylic on

board and am inspired by everyday things such as household chores and my garden; I tend to use my family and pets as models.

I am very much influenced by Stanley Spencer who I think is an incredible artist. I enjoy seeing people's response to my art and hopefully I can make them smile.



Q. What are your plans for your future as an

artist?

A. Ideally I would like to be exhibiting regularly and producing prints, postcards and greetings cards as an affordable way to buy art. I have never exhibited before and only ever sold one picture.

News From Neroche Parish Council

Our new Clerk to the Parish Council, Gillian Midworth, has kindly agreed to produce a regular feature for our Newsletter

This is my introductory article for the Newsletter as I have recently been appointed as the new Clerk to Neroche Parish Council

In addition to Neroche Parish Council, I have been undertaking the role of Clerk to neighbouring West Hatch Parish Council for seven years and I am also the Clerk to the small parish of Beercrocombe.



I look forward to working with everyone in the community of Neroche and becoming more familiar with the Parish. I find that walking a dog is a great way to learn about places and I often walk our dog along the Herepath and through Bickenhall. I can foresee that the dog will have even more exercise as I explore the parish further!

I have already become aware of the great community spirit within the Parish and a good example of this is the summer Scarecrow Competition. All my family enjoyed seeking out the scarecrows and voting for their particular favourite.

The summer months are often quieter for Parish Councils, after the busy time of Annual Parish Meetings and completion of annual accounts, but now that autumn is approaching, and the holiday season finishes, the workload increases.



The most recent Parish Council meeting took place on 12th September and a variety of issues were discussed. One item which will be of particular interest to parishioners is the introduction of Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) within the parish.

The Parish Council has requested SIDs in two locations, opposite the Polo Ground (on Thurlbear Straight), and at Staple Fitzpaine (near New Road). Initial speed readings have been taken to ensure

that the locations meet the criteria for installation. As a result of these readings, the location at the Polo ground qualifies for inclusion in the programme. This means that a SID will be installed for a period of two weeks on a regular basis (every four months).

The speed readings at Staple Fitzpaine were not high enough to justify automatic inclusion to the programme, but a secondary speed reading will now be taken using a SID. This will be installed for a two week period and will give a truer representative figure of the speed at which vehicles are travelling. The Parish Council has no dates as yet for the installation of these devices but if you see them appear on the roads, then you will know the reason why!

You may be aware that The Orchard Portman Nursing Home has recently



announced the closure of all the nursing home beds in the older parts of the building. Nursing home beds will remain in the newer extension and the Pavilion Hospital will continue to operate. The Parish Council has invited representatives of the Orchard Portman site to the next Parish Council meeting on November 14th, so that we may learn of any future development plans for the site.

I would like to remind everyone that Parish Council meetings are public events and members of the community are invited to attend. The District and County Councillors are often in attendance and parishioners do have the opportunity to ask questions at the beginning of the meeting. The dates of the meetings are published on the website, so do come along if you wish to raise an issue or merely hear about what is happening in the parish.



Reroche Local History Group: The Lost Houses

Somerset has been inhabited over the millennia. Across on the levels, the Sweet track dates from the 4th millennium BC. In our own locality we know of two late Iron Age hill forts, one at Castle Neroche and the other at Orchard Hill. Both Bickenhall (*Bichehalle/halda*) and Staple Fitzpaine (*Staple/Estapla*) are named in the Domesday book.

We know that a Portman descendent Lady Rachel Portman lived in Bickenhall during the Tudor period. There are suggestions there was a medieval settlement along the Staple Ridge in the area of Ruttersleigh and Shute's Farm. And so the list goes on.

As a local history group we have become curious about the houses from the 18th and 19th centuries that have disappeared. Some are identifiable from the



early OS maps. Others are known about by locals who have lived in the parish all or most of their lives. Some come from people who have looked into their family history and searched for the family home or at least the site where it may have stood.

It is said that when you are searching for the sites of old houses, if you come across domestic plants, such as a gooseberry bush, it may well indicate the spot. A known site along Middleroom Lane is recognised by the signs of snowdrops and daffodils in the early spring months.

So as the history group, we are embarking upon a new and original research project. Through the efforts of many people we have so far identified in the region of about 20 lost houses.

The Victorian Census tells us that most people worked on the land and the largest number of them were agricultural labourers. Their small houses are likely to have been roughly built and may have only consisted of between two to four rooms.

One part of our study will be to try to work out what the houses may have looked like. Many of them were likely to have thatched roofs and may be similar to Stuckey's Cottage as shown in a painting from the late 1960s before the property was extensively redeveloped.



In November we will be reporting on our progress so far, so if you are interested or if you have any local knowledge or information that may help please come along to the meeting.

A message from Huw Jenkins

(Police Sergeant to the Taunton Urban and Rural Neighbourhood Beat Team)



It pains me to say it but it's that time of year when the evenings are drawing in, and as such rural crime tends to rise as the daylight hours dwindle. With the autumn approaching we are all busy having our lawn mowers serviced for the long winter storage and ordering our central heating oil for those cold winter nights.

This is when our cunning criminal knows when to hit us hard-and-fast to take the newly serviced mower or to pop in to help themselves to the newly filled oil tank. So here are my top ten tips to hopefully help you avoid become a victim.



Always try and have your oil tank secured with a padlock, and if you can, hide the location of your tank with wooden panelling, especially if your tank can be seen from the road.

2) Fit an external security light with a sensor, there is no need to turn your home into Alcatraz prison, but let's try and put the criminals off by making your home look unappetizing and not an easy target.

3) Ensure that your mowers are covered-up and away from prying eyes; you never know who might be looking down your driveway or over your hedge. If it's easy to be seen, it can be easy to steal.



- 4) If you are not at home, make sure you close your shed or garage doors and lock them when you can.
- 5) If you have gates to your property, let's keep them closed whenever possible and consider locking them at night.

6) Don't leave your vehicles unsecured at night, even in isolated areas car crime can be a problem. Don't leave valuables in the vehicle overnight, if there is nothing valuable or easy to grab inside, the criminal won't give it a second look.

7) Don't leave items lying about outside, such as ladders and tools. Let's not give the criminals the implements to make their job easier.

8) If you are popping out for the evening always try leaving a light on in the house to give the impression that someone is home.



The same for when you're away on that hard earned holiday, install some cheap, yet effective timers to turn those lights on and off whilst you are away.

9) If you have a dog, then advertise the fact by putting up a "beware



of the dog" sign; there is nothing more off-putting than seeing a sign with a picture of a vicious dog to make someone walk-on-by. If you don't have a dog, then put a sign up anyway to give the impression that any unwanted visited wouldn't receive a warm welcome.

10) Keep me and my colleagues apprised of

suspicious activities in your area. If we don't know about what is happening, then how can we stop it? So, if it's urgent then dial 999, if it's not then call us on 101. Alternatively email us on ssntauntonurbanandrural@avonandsomerset.pnn.police.uk.

I hope this helps to keep you all safe in the coming months.

John Williams, Borough Councillor for Neroche Ward and Leader of Taunton Deane Borough Council, has kindly offered to write a regular column for our Newsletter.


Potential Joint Management and Shared Services with West Somerset I am often asked the question "why is Taunton Deane exploring the potential for joint management and shared services with West Somerset Council?" The answer is simple, to see if we can make savings that will protect front-line services most valued by the community we serve.

It is encouraging seeing that the numbers 'stack-up' and that substantial savings can be made through joint management and sharing services. A business case is being prepared that will be considered by



authorities in October and November. It will be for all Councillors to make the final decision

The first important step has been taken, the agreement to have a Joint Chief Executive, which already shows worthwhile savings. Clearly, both councils face immense financial challenges in the short and medium term. Joining management and sharing services will make substantial savings but will not provide the complete answer. Difficult decisions remain to be made as we approach the annual budget-setting process. The key point for me is that any



money saved on management and back-office costs means more for you, the community that I represent, to provide the key services valued by so many.

Shakespeare Festival In the previous issue of your Newsletter, I mentioned William Shakespeare's classic performances of The Merchant of Venice and a Midsummers Night Dream, being held on Castle Green. I was delighted to welcome the GB Theatre Company in early August for some absolutely superb performances.

It was not without its challenges for both performers and audiences, not least from an invasion of seagulls and the bus stops nearby! However, the general consensus from those who attended was one of great entertainment and truly excellent performances. We are certainly encouraging a return visit, hopefully on an annual basis.



Somerset Remembers' Project sure many readers will be interested in a Government inspired initiative to commemorate the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War. It has led to the setting-up of the "Somerset Remembers" project, and further interesting details can accessed www.somersetremembers.wordpress.com. As part of this project, special commemoration goes to local recipients of the Victoria Cross. This has revealed that there has been only one Victoria Cross holder born in Somerset, and this just happens to be right next door to Neroche Parish in West Hatch. The recipient was John Collins VC DCM MM who was born at West. Hatch in 1880. He was awarded the VC in 1917 for bravery during fighting in Palestine. John served with the Royal Welsh Fusiliers and is buried in Merthyr Tydfil.

As somebody that was also born and brought up in West Hatch, this is of particular interest to me and I am trying to find out where the Collin's family

home was in West Hatch, without success so far, but will keep trying and let you know the outcome in the next newsletter.

I would also note we do have another famous VC holder buried at Hatch Beauchamp, Colonel John Chard VC, but he was born in Plymouth so is not a Somerset-born medal holder. He came to live with his brother who was a Clergyman in Hatch Beauchamp but was diagnosed with a terminal illness from which he died and was buried in Hatch Beauchamp churchyard.



The Brewhouse Theatre The good news is, the Council has agreed to acquire the building and is working with advisers and interested parties to try and establish the best way to secure a sustainable, affordable and fully operational theatre and arts centre. I really would like to see it up and running by Christmas but with the booking periods for shows, and the



marketing required to be successful, a more realistic time will be early 2014 for a return to anything like normal business.

A Few Notes from the Farming Community

As many of us living in the Parish do not fully comprehend the world of farming, in past issues of this Newsletter, local farmers have written about the work that they do and the problems they face. This month we are giving them a rest, and featuring a thought-provoking initiative recently launched by the National Farmers Union (NFU).

Stand on any piece of high ground in Neroche Parish, look as far as the eye can see, and there is no doubting that we live within, and are surrounded by, a hardworking and committed farming workforce.

The results of their endeavours are clear for all to see: well-tended and managed land; healthy farm stock; and a variety of crops.





For some it is a vocation, for others just a job, but the end result is the same - food for our tables. In addition, local farmers are major contributors to the well-being of the local Neroche community strong supporters of St Peter's Church; active in local events (often allowing the use of their buildings, facilities and land); there to help when you need a hand; added to which, two full-time farmers sit Neroche Parish Council

Neroche residents will be pleased to hear, therefore, that

the NFU has launched a 'Back British Farming' charter; in support of its new

campaign to turn-around a decline in the country's self-sufficiency (the UK currently produces just 62% of its own food, importing £37.6 billion of food and drink per year!). The NFU is hoping the public, together with politicians,



retailers, caterers, chefs, and restaurateurs, will sign the charter and pledge their support for Britain's farmers.

The campaign calls for more food produced by the nation's farmers to be sourced, stocked and bought in the UK. It also wants government support for farmers, in their challenge to

produce more food to feed the nation.

NFU President, Peter Kendall said "The decline in self-sufficiency in many

be should sectors warning signal. As anation we cannot simply round the world go chasing the cheapest deal for our food. Consumers are our best ally; I would ask them to continue showing their support by demanding of their local supermarket, restaurant and MP etc – what are you doing to back British farming?"



Maybe it is for us rural dwellers, who live amongst the farming community, to take the lead, and hope that others will follow? Just a thought.



The Art of the Blackdowns Exhibition

(Which featured local Neroche Villages' artists)

The Art of the Blackdowns exhibition was held at Cotley Tithe Barn, Cotley, Nr Chard between 14th September and 6th October. Among the many amazing exhibits were two stunning pieces by Gillian Widden (Thurlbear) and Andre Wallace (Curland).

The exhibition, inspired by the heritage and landscape of the Blackdown Hills, encouraged exhibiting artists to examine a different facet of the social, physical and cultural environment, reflecting the importance for artists to



make work that is connected to the area they live in. The exhibition marked the finale of 'Skills Unearthed', a two-year project inspired by the industry and crafts of the Blackdown Hills; funded by 'Arts Council England' and 'Making it Local'

Gillian Widden's work, entitled 'Kings, Queens, and Buttons', was inspired by the teasel drying poles used by Somerset farmers. This artwork comprises six charred, ten foot high hazel poles, which have then been stacked with 'hands' (bunches) of wild teasels. Approximately 12,000 teasels have been used to create this artwork; 10,000 to 20,000 teasels

being an average day's cut for an adult teasel cutter. In an era that values all things technological, this piece reflects the hard physical work required to produce a successful cash crop.

Andre Wallace's 'work in progress' exhibit takes the form of a floating male figure set within a spatial framework, which suggests ecclesiastical architectural elements such as doors and windows. Andre explained "I want the viewer to reflect on the work's presence and mystery, with the figure floating and rising within a structure that recalls the stillness of a church space."

Gardening Corner

Rebecca Pow, a local garden writer and broadcaster on national radio and television, has kindly agreed to write a regular column for our Newsletter on local horticulture and craft skills.

This summer, for once, the arable farmers in our community were able to gather their crops in safely, without the devastating downpours of the previous summer. And this year too, there was plentiful straw available to pass on to our livestock farmers for bedding, which is not always the case.

One rather unusual use for straw was showcased recently in our local garden, in the form of some giant straw apples, courtesy of skilful young sculptor, Bryony Tidball from



nearby Martock. She specialises in working with straw to produce her unique sculptures, inspired by corn dolly folklore and an interest in making art out of what is essentially a by-product. Corn dollies were made in times-gone-by to



ward-off evil spirits, and farmers kept them from one year to another to provide good omens for the following year.

Utilising old techniques, Bryony created her giant apples to form the focal point for an arty garden trail, in which our garden at Tuckers Farmhouse was included, during Somerset Art Week.

I was delighted, by the way, to welcome a number of Neroche-ites to the open garden event, albeit over the hill in Stoke St Mary. The garden trail was the first tie-up between the art week and National Garden Scheme charities, and illustrated what wonderful backdrops gardens can be for art works. As well as the straw sculptures, a number of willow animals were also salted away in the garden to surprise visitors – everything from an elephant to a horse, some herons and a pair

of startled deer. These were made by two gifted local artists, Fons Cousins from Blagdon Hill, and Elaine Marks from Martock. The individual art works were a real attraction, making great focal points.

Whilst not presuming to call myself an artist, I do, however, regard my garden as a kind of canvass where I have endeavoured to create a series



of 'natural' pictures, with framed views and vistas to draw the eye and entice the visitor on through it. It's a technique used in many of our great gardens and which I've been lucky enough to appreciate first hand whilst working on various TV gardening programmes over the years. Like many before me, I've stored up the ideas and tried to copy them!

Talking of filming, the first documentary I ever produced for television was



made right here, in the early 1990s, for HTV, and focused on the great debate about whether the Blackdown Hills should be turned into an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It's hard to believe that it caused so much controversy, considering how much the area has progressed since the AONB designation and how the countryside and its communities have benefited from the association in terms of the development of tourism, artisan craft businesses. local food

production, not to mention the spawning of the multitude of events and activities in the area. By the way, in the film, called 'Blackdown Fever', I was wafting around the hills on a bike in a tiered yellow skirt with frilly socks – a far cry from today's image! (I wonder if anyone remembers it?)

Neroche Woodlanders. Local craft skills are being kept very much alive by the Neroche Woodlanders, whose main base and focus is Young Wood, Staple Fitzpaine. I caught up with some of them recently, working with children at a Family Fun event.

I was struck by one little girl who was completely engaged doing something as simple as whittling a stick, with gentle encouragement from Woodlander, Gavin Saunders. No laptops, mobile phones or iPads in sight and the children seemed completely immersed in working with their hands, making crafts from greenwood, enjoying a brush with nature, finding out about forest



conservation and learning about a way of life that is totally alien to them.

The on-going projects with children in Halcon, and also with the Taunton Association for the Homeless, are funded by Somerset County Council through Somerset Skills and Learning. They are really paying dividends, as Gavin from the Neroche team explained: "People find it therapeutic. The interesting thing is, it works for them. It's different to their every day, it's quiet and it's peaceful. People feel at home very quickly, as a way of occupying their hands and sorting out their minds at the same time"

I couldn't endorse that enough. Nature has a restorative and restful power. You can feel it in our beautiful landscapes and even in the garden on a wintry day when the plants are crispy with frost and the morning sun is just coming up. It costs nothing and it's all around us, stop for a moment and breathe it in.

Taunton Flower Show - Local Successes

Anson Cup Winner

At the recent prestigious Taunton Flower Show, Orchard Portman's Joy Garland, won the 'Fun With Glass' Anson Cup class in the Novice Floral Art & Floristry section.

Joy commented "This was my first exhibit so it was on a bigger scale than what I had created previously, it needed to fill a specified area and be viewed all round and judged from the front.

I came up with a design using 5 mirrors forming a 'petal shaped' base which captured the reflection of colours and shapes of the flowers which I had wired into a metal candle ring encircling the inside of the glass bowl. The flowers and foliage were all placed in water with trailing ivy cascading down to the mirrors below. I enhanced the colours of pink and white further by inverting a pink glass dish as a stand and adding narrow pink ribbon around some of the mirrors.



I was overjoyed to win the novice class and to receive the **Anson Cup**. I have just commenced a level 2 Floristry course at Cannington College today and am thrilled to have the opportunity to learn the theory and skills necessary to work creatively with flowers. I've always had a love of flowers, drawing and painting them and enjoying their wonderful scented displays."

Curland's Rob Larkman also did exceptionally well at the show and said, "My potato crop was very productive this year, particularly "Casablanca" and these came 3rd in the class. A dish of 10 raspberries came 1st as did my collection of three other fruits (cherries/blackcurrants/sylvan berries). A single 'Handel' rose also came 3rd. Sadly my home made blackcurrant jelly was up against stiff opposition and only made it as an also ran."


