

Residents consider impact of A358 plans

Expressway to the South West

Highways England presents a single, initial A358 upgrade option

Highways England, on behalf of the Government, has started a consultation on a number of road schemes to create 'an expressway to the South West', which it says will deliver faster, safer and more reliable journeys between the South East and the South West peninsula, as well as boosting economic growth.



Specifically, an upgrade is planned from the A303 near Stonehenge to a new proposed M5 junction in the Killams Avenue area of Taunton, creating a "strategic A-road" or

expressway, which, it is claimed, will be "just as safe and reliable as a motorway" and where "mile-a-minute" travel is the norm.

Closer to home, local events have been held on proposals to upgrade the A358 between the M5 at Taunton and the A303 – see the map on the front page.

This proposed route has been divided into two sections:

- A new motorway junction and dual carriageway from the M5, extending north of Orchard Portman and Thurlbear, to West Hatch Lane where it will join the existing A358
- Widening the existing A358 from West Hatch Lane to Southfields roundabout to create a 70mph dual carriageway

The first stage of consultation launched in April when Highways England announced the road scheme and held a number of events which featured this single option. At the consultation/presentation event at the racecourse I attended, no alternative option was featured, and there was no indication either that the lanes which currently give access to the A358 would be blocked off, or that there would be no way of joining or leaving the proposed Junction 25A other than via the expressway.

The consultation was due to close on 20 May but our parish council received notification that, in keeping with pre-election guidance, Highways England has paused public consultation.

Therefore the scheduled public exhibition on 8 May at the Holiday Inn, as well as Highways England's attendance at all other public events during the election period, have been postponed. Events will be rescheduled and published after the General Election and the consultation period will be extended.

Once the consultation recommences, feedback will inform a more detailed design stage before Highways England announces its preferred route this winter.

This will then be subject to further consultation before an application (the Development Consent Order) is made to the Planning Inspectorate which then holds a public examination before making a recommendation to the Transport Secretary who decides whether it goes ahead.

Importantly, Highways England has to prove the adequacy of its consultation to the local authorities before the application can be considered by the Planning Inspectorate. If you have any comments on the adequacy of the consultation itself, these are best directed at Taunton Deane Borough Council and Somerset County Council initially, as well as Highways England, perhaps copying in the local MP too, once elected.

Subject to all that, construction is expected to start in 2020.

The A358 upgrade is clearly a major issue in our area, and was a hot topic at the Annual Parish Meeting (see overleaf) and the Extraordinary Parish Council meeting.

The latter was well attended and parishioners aired their views and concerns which will be reflected in the Parish Council's formal response.



There was a good attendance at the annual parish meeting

and 'An Update on the Recent G4 Wi-Fi Broadband Installations in our Parish by Exmoor Technologies'.

Then there were a few short presentations by: Tim French, chairman of the Communication Action Group; Jane Hole, chair of the History Group; Gary Larsen, our village agent; and David Spears on 'The Big Bang Science and Engineering Festival'.

There were stands situated all around the edge of the hall representing most of the clubs and



organisations in the parish, including The Garden Club, Walking Group, History Society, Parish Council, Neroche Hall, Communication Action Group (website, newsletter and email alert), St Peter's Church, St Peter's Singers, The Thursday Lunch Club, WI and Neroche Artists.

The stands generated a lot of interest; and as would be expected, there was a lot of debate generated around the large map on the parish council stand, which showed the Proposed Single Route for the A358 Improvement Scheme.

Introducing our new county councillor

Voters went to the polls in the county council election on May 4 and as a result Conservative candidate **John Thorne** took over from Liberal Democrat Ross Henley as our representative. Here he introduces himself in what we hope will be the first of a regular update.

I am both proud and delighted to have been elected to serve the Neroche villages as a county councillor, thanks to so many people across the area placing their trust in me. I am looking forward to attending many local events and meeting people over the next four years.

The newsletter's tag line, 'Working together for a better community', is a very appropriate one, and I hope that I can work with everybody to help improve what is already an impressively vibrant community and tackle issues of concern wherever possible.

I have been reading the newsletter to help keep up to speed with local news and I am very impressed with the huge and diverse range of events and activities across the villages.

As a former cinema owner, I was particularly interested in the Friday Film Nights. Unfortunately, I work on Fridays, so I will not have many opportunities to go along but I will support it as much as I can.

I also worked closely with Rebecca Pow, MP at the time and now parliamentary candidate, and your Taunton Deane councillor, John Williams, who both did a tremendous job in supporting and encouraging me and helping me to keep tabs on local issues of concern.

Now for a little bit about me as a person.

I have two young sons who live with me for half of each week, I work part-time on the checkouts for Tesco, I am an active football referee, I speak some Italian (although I'm slow and rusty these days) and I have a condition which means I find it difficult to recognise people's

faces unless I have met them several times (no, that's not an excuse for why I often get people's names muddled up).

For anybody who is not quite sure, the Blackdown and Neroche division is one of the largest in Somerset, and



stretches from the Neroche villages through Stoke St Mary and Corfe, all the way over the Blackdown Hills villages of Pitminster, Blagdon Hill, Bishopswood, and Churchinford, to Wellington (where it even includes some of the town centre), and then through West Buckland to Junction 25, taking in Ruishton and Henlade, and then back down the A358 through Thornfalcon to Hatch Beauchamp.

If that sounds huge and diverse, that is because it is! So, for one councillor like myself, it is a massive task to try to get around and tackle the variety of issues which will need to be addressed, and I know that I will not be able to do it without the help of your parish and Deane councillors and others in the community.

I worked very hard when I was previously a Deane councillor for the Blackdowns part of the division, and for the past two years I have also served as a town councillor for Wellington. I will continue to put in just as much effort in my new role as your county councillor.

You will find that I am very approachable, and even if you don't agree with me, I will still want to hear your views.

Taunton Deane Borough Council News

University of Somerset

At last we are seeing a start on the long and complex journey of achieving the establishment of a University of Somerset preceded by the recent setting up of a University Centre Somerset by Bridgwater and Taunton College.

The main campus is being established in Taunton with Engineering/Nuclear Centre at Bridgwater and Horticulture at Cannington, It is to be welcomed for the good of Somerset and Taunton Deane.

The University Centre Somerset was successfully launched with its own designated campus in the Wellington Road buildings. We welcome this as it will provide a huge economic





boost for Taunton as it grows and becomes established.

Toneway Funding

As a council, and personally, I am keenly aware of the concerns expressed about the lack of adequate roads and support services to cope with the planned increase in housing numbers. Therefore securing substantial grant funding, from Government to improve the



capacity along the Toneway Corridor – the stretch of road at Creech Castle and the Sainsbury's roundabout - has to be welcomed. It is one of five schemes in Somerset to gain a total grant of £24,000,000 to enable us to address the genuine concerns expressed.

The Toneway Corridor scheme will improve access into Taunton town centre from the M5 at Junction 25 and capacity at the Creech Castle junction.

Improving our infrastructure is key to delivering our Growth Programme in Taunton Deane and to assist we have been awarded £6,400,000 from the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) towards the £9,800,000 projected cost of the project. The balance will come from Somerset County Council funds and from Taunton Deane using funds collected from the various developments.

Measures to improve traffic flow along the A358 and this vital arterial road into Taunton are welcomed, notwithstanding whatever final plans are agreed for the dualling of the A358.

A358 Upgrade Southfields, Ilminster to J25 of the M5 I thought I should just share my thoughts since the disappointing publication of a single option route out for consultation!

One thing is certain, we have to work constructively with Highways England to ensure, after many false dawns, we capture the huge investment in our roads system that is on the cards at present. I hear

and share some of the concerns that we are not delivering any economic benefit for Taunton, not delivering the much-needed Henlade bypass, not providing the



required access road to the major new employment site planned at J25 and the planned new junction J25A is in the worst possible place.

Highways England say they have counter arguments to these points so we must work with them to fully understand their reasoning and where we have a differing view try and influence through the consultation process. One thing is certain the road through Henlade is at absolute capacity and we have to take action to relieve the long-suffering residents from the misery they suffer at present!

Formation of New Council covering Taunton Deane and West Somerset

Our proposal to create a new Council has now been submitted to the Government. The submission is based on last year's Business Case and updates by councillors since. It also shares the feedback and representations made during the consultation exercise. The submission is now published on our dedicated website www.yournewcouncil.org/news

We await to hear from the Department of Communities and Local Government, but the anticipated timetable is for an acceptance or otherwise before the Parliamentary Summer recess. If positive, legislation will follow to allow setting up a "shadow authority" and full elections to the new Council in May 2019.

Having rechecked our business case as previously presented we remain confident that the annual savings of £3.1m are achievable. In turn this will support the retention of our front line services such as sport, recreation swimming pools and parks and gardens, so valued by our community.

Affordable Housing Demand

I recently attended the opening of an affordable housing site of 28 dwellings, which attracted 216 applicants. It is a salutary reminder of

the desperate need for affordable housing. The successful tenants had to have local connections as it is a requirement of the lease that these are given first choice.

As further evidence of demand, our own Taunton Deane Borough Council 'Housing Waiting List' has around 2,600



families registered, reinforcing the need for us to continue delivering much needed affordable housing and for the open market to contribute.



The Farming Calendar

by Mark Pope at Staple Farm

At the time of writing the weather is very dry, the wind not over warm and there's a bit of a lazy wind that goes through you rather than round you.


Our rainfall has been very low - in fact the total for last year was about half our normal

I hope that by the time you read this summer has arrived and we are having warm nights and days with the occasional night's warm rain.

This year the crops are generally looking good having come through the winter well.

We have this year planted some spring barley. We brought this crop into our rotation to help get better control of a ve

rotation to help get better control of a very difficult weed known as Black Grass.



We have noticed an increase in earthworm numbers and the soil seemed to keep a better structure and does not appear as sticky as in other fields. However, the proof will be in the yield of crop we get at harvest time. On the combine harvester, we have a yield meter that can measure the quantity of crop over a given area.

By the time you read this, the miscanthus should have been cut and bailed and brought back to the farm. This is now used in our biomass boiler to heat the workshops and stores and the house.

From spring through to mid-summer we are making sure the crops have fertiliser at the right time and treating the crops for any diseases. This involves a fair amount of crop walking to see what is happening in each field.

Also, we are just emptying out the last of last year's crop from the grain store. This store then has to have in effect a spring clean. Not the nicest of jobs. It involves cleaning all the dust and old crop out from top to bottom. To do this we will normally use a large compressor to blow off the dust, this is then hoovered up. If we don't keep the grain store clean we risk allowing mites and insects to build up and contaminate the new crop.

We will shortly start to cut the grass for our first cut of silage, if the weather plays fair and we get our sunshine and a few showers we hope to make three cuts of silage. So over the next few months there will be tractors and machines about so please take care on the roads.

This year the oilseed rape will be the first crop to be harvested followed by the winter wheat then the spring barley and finally the field beans.

If you go down in the woods today ...

It's been another busy winter at Young Wood, and it's great to see the leaves unfurling once again and the bright blue of the bluebells beginning to flicker across the forest floor, amongst the wild garlic and wood anemones.

Such an uplifting time of year to witness the life of the forest, with the daily symphony of bird song – rhythmic great tit and chiffchaff, urgent nuthatch, tuneful robin, blackbird and blackcap, and occasional percussion of a woodpecker.

We have been thinning and re-coppicing in Twelve Acre Copse this winter, letting light reach the forest floor and creating the foundation for new habitats for nesting birds next year. In the process we've harvested the raw material for making charcoal next season, while now we prepare to make charcoal with the seasoned wood from the previous winter.

There's lots happening in the woods this spring. We've run two very successful 'Forest Folk' days for families over the Easter holidays, and a 'Dangerous Dads' day for fathers and their children to have fun with fire making and shelter building.



We've several greenwood craft courses

coming up – Spoon Making on 21 May and Letter Carving on 11 June.

Woodlanders also offers bespoke commissions - for example, house signs made to order. Email gavin@nerochewoodlanders.org for more details.

And we now sell charcoal! Fire up your barbecue with locally-made, sustainable hardwood charcoal which helps support our work in using the forest for wellbeing and social

the forest for wellbeing and social benefit.

We will be running a series of events to search out as many species as possible, in a Lottery-funded project called Meet the Neighbours. Look out for dates at www.youngwood.org.uk

Neroche Villages website is changing By Tim French

The Neroche Villages website - nerochevillages.org.uk - was launched six years ago by the Neroche Communication Action Group to let those with access to a computer know what was happening in our area and to promote local businesses. It became the official website for the Neroche Parish Council and so a way of learning about the council's activities and getting information it sends out. But many changes have occurred since the website was created. As a result, the content of parts of the website needs to be updated and the website needs to be redesigned.

Changes in the community

In the last few years our area has seen new residents arrive, new businesses develop, activities in the parish increase and those running them change. As a result we need to update the content of the website so that the information is correct and useful to users.

We will need your help to do this.

We would ask those involved with a club, society or other group to go to the website and check if their group is on it and if the details are correct. We are also concerned that we are missing some new businesses operating or based in our parishes. Every business, whatever size, is entitled to a free listing of basic details on the Business page of the website (and the addition of email and/or website addresses for a small fee, with the cost used towards running the website). If your group or business is not listed, or if details are incorrect, please use the Contact page on nerochevillages.org.uk and tell us and we will rectify the problem.

Viewing websites on smart phones

Originally websites were viewed on computer screens. Today, more and more people use a mobile phone. This creates a problem as traditional websites viewed on a phone are small and can be difficult to read. We took advice and will be converting Neroche Villages website. It will look much the same on a computer screen but will alter shape to become easier to read on a tablet or phone. This will make it

more useful to residents wishing to quickly get community or parish council information.

Joining the website team

The website is kept up to date by three members of the communication group who spend a few hours or less, every third week, editing the site. Neroche History Group

Jane Hole, chair of Neroche Local History Group, shares her findings on the little-known Exon Domesday

Most people have probably heard about the Great Domesday Book and know the survey was conducted at the behest of William the Conqueror in 1086. Less well-known is the Exon Domesday.

Somerset Museum in Taunton recently held an exhibition about the Exon Domesday and I was lucky enough to attend the sell-out lecture by Dr Frank Thorn, the foremost living editor and translator of Domesday Book.

The Exon Domesday has been preserved for many centuries in Exeter Cathedral Library and is named after the Latin word for Exeter (*Exonia*). In 2011 it was removed from its 19 century binding so that digital photography and detailed study could begin. Since then a research project by a team, from King's College London and the University of Oxford, has been uncovering the document's secrets from its 532 parchment pages.

Ultimately it will mean the 1,000-year-old manuscript will be digitised and can be used by schools, local historians and academic researchers across the world. The project ends this year and hopefully the results will become available to us all.

Exon Domesday covers the five western counties of Cornwall, Devon, Somerset, Dorset and Wiltshire, although not all of it has survived. The other regional surveys that make up Great Domesday are all abbreviated and thus some of the detail from the original texts has been lost to posterity.

The Exon is unabridged and remains full of the minute detail and the idiosyncrasies left in by the clerks that would have been removed had it been abridged. The study identified that 26 different scribes wrote up the Exon. Eight of the pages relating to Somerset were on display at the museum.

When the Exon was removed from its binding it became apparent the pages had not been bound in chronological order. When the pages were placed in sequence what had previously appeared just as a mark on separate sheets was



discovered to be the outline of a medieval spearhead imprinted across two of the Somerset pages, shown in the image above.

Dr Thorn described the detail of the survey - the King required that "not one ox, cow, sheep, or pig" was to be left out. There were over 13,800 manors (an estate held by a landlord) in England in 1086, each of which was surveyed over a ten month period. The level of detail is extraordinary. It describes; who held it in King Edward's time, who held it in 1086, how many hides (amount of land which could be ploughed in a year using one ox-drawn plough), how many of the ploughs were owned by the lord and how many by the local people, the number of villagers, how many owned their dwelling, how many were slaves, and so on. Its primary purpose of course was to raise money for the King.

The accuracy and durability of the Domesday Survey is illustrated by the fact it was last used in a dispute over land in Norfolk in 1920!

The significance of the mark is not yet known.

These longer, lighter days certainly put a spring in your step. I don't want to spoil your enjoyment of them, but they can bring out the crooks, so please be extra vigilant. Scams are everywhere these days and I'm absolutely amazed at the brazen cheek of some of them.

A current favourite is that you receive a phone call from someone purporting to be a solicitor and claiming that you have won £5,000 in a quiz/lottery/draw. They tell you that you need to have £200 in cash handy so



you can claim the money and they will send someone round to your house to collect it or even take you to the cash point free of charge! It's a scam. The general rule is that if it's too good to be true, it probably is.

Another scam affects computer users. You get a phone call from someone claiming that your computer has a virus and they can remove it for you if you pay them. No, it's another scam.

The most current problem is opening an email from a friend/company/anyone with an attachment that you don't recognise BUT as soon as you open that attachment it releases the virus into the computer and you have to ring a special telephone number to pay criminals to unlock your computer.

Please don't open any email attachment that you haven't specifically asked for or you can't verify the owner immediately. It could come from a friend whose own computer has been hacked.

If you have any computer crime concerns, feel free to call me. I may be able to help.

Power of Attorney

On a separate matter, I've been asked about Power of Attorney. This can be quite a complicated issue and is very important to get right. Age UK has a good information sheet which can be obtained from its website or you can ring me and get some further details.

Silversurfers

Finally, I've had a look at an interesting website called Silversurfers which has interviews and articles and general news for the over 50s - I know, I don't look it!. There's also the Silverline service if you are feeling lonely and want to chat to someone on the telephone for information, friendship or advice. The service is available 24 hours a day on 0800 4708090.

That's all for now, but do get in touch if I can help you to get the most out of village life.

Update from the Forestry Commission

John Burgess brings us up to speed with events at Castle Neroche

After a few quiet months in the forests things have suddenly got busy. As I write this we are in the middle of a significant clearfell at Castle Neroche that will make a big difference to the views from the top of the monument, and change the feel as you drive down from the ridge.

This has been forced on us by the discovery of diseased larch trees which leads to a compulsory order to remove the rest of the surrounding tree. This is in order to try to prevent the onwards spread of the spores and this site acting as a stepping stone which could then infect further sites.

We had planned to clear a very small area of the site where tree cover had crept over the ramparts of the Castle. The removal of these trees helps to further visualise the full extent of what was a very impressive creation. This will go ahead in a period of dry weather to ensure absolutely minimal disturbance to the soil structure.

The work is undertaken by Kleen Kutt, a local timber harvesting

company seen here undertaking one of the most complex areas along the roadside edge. The work was undertaken with minimal disruption to traffic. We had already planned to



thin the trees at the site and will continue with the thinning elsewhere on the site over the rest of the summer, this will give space for the remaining trees to grow, will allow more light to reach the forest floor, helping the bluebells to thrive. We appreciate everyone's patience and thank them in advance for following the signs and diversion necessary for safety.

In late April we also welcomed a new member of staff in the Neroche office – Rob, who is Community Engagement Ranger. Caring for your Furry Family

In our series which puts the spotlight on local enterprises, **Jacq Wanstall** talks to Fay Mackenzie about her pet care business

Fay Mackenzie lives in Staple Fitzpaine and is a local pet expert. She established Fay's Pet Care in 2012 and now looks after roughly 100 pets each year.

I caught up with Fay on a dog walk to find out more about the pet care services she offers and why her job is the best in the world.

Why did you set up your business?

I worked for a bank for a number of years and felt I wasn't suited to that kind of job. I have grown up around animals and I had originally planned to work with horses one day, but at the time there was a calling for more dog walkers in Taunton, so that's how Fay's Pet Care was founded.

How long have you lived in the area?

I have lived in Staple Fitzpaine for 18 years, having moved to the village with my family in 1999. But I grew up in Hatch Beauchamp and lived briefly in Broadway as a child, so have always been very local to this area.

What does your typical day look like?


A normal day would be to pick up my first group of dogs - I take up to five at a time - and drive them to one of the local walks. My morning slot is usually in the Blackdowns. Thurlbear Wood or Priors Park woods are the favourites. I then take those dogs home, and pick up my next group, and we often head to the Quantocks. Wind Down woods is a particular favourite. If I have any other pets booked in, such as horses, cats or small furries, I visit them before or after the dog walks.

What type of animals do you care for?

Dogs mainly, but I also look after cats, horses, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens etc. Some more unusual pets I've looked after are bearded dragons, degus and tortoises, and I have even looked after a pet sheep!

What's your favourite breed of dog?

Well my own dog is a Jack Russell and she is a great little dog, so she takes the top prize. But I've always liked huskies, and I love the Labrador's happygo-lucky view on life, and the Hungarian Vizsla



is a stunning dog. So there are quite a few!

What has been the most characterful pet you've looked after? One of the funniest characters would have to be a toy-sized Yorkshire terrier named Eddie. He was the tiniest dog I've ever walked, but nobody ever told him that! He commanded respect from every other dog, and merely walking among the others would have them submitting to him, it really was quite a sight. Even the biggest pooches never questioned Eddie's status as top dog.

What's the best and worst thing about your job?

The best thing is being privileged to be able to walk well-behaved lovely dogs in the beautiful countryside on a sunny day. The worst thing is the weather in winter (perhaps a bit predictable). Broadband for Neroche Parish

Lynne Spoors explains the latest position

Connecting Devon & Somerset Phase 2
The Parish Council has been closely monitoring
Connecting Devon & Somerset Phase 2, for
news of fibre broadband for the parish.

Connecting Devon & Somerset (CDS) recently announced that the successful contract bidder to provide Phase 2 fibre broadband for the majority of the Blackdown Hills area including Neroche Parish, is a company called Gigaclear.



We have just received the following message from them:

"Gigaclear will be installing a new, pure fibre-to-the-premises broadband network in your area over the next three

years bringing speeds from 50Mbps up to 1000Mbps to properties in the area.



Currently, Gigaclear and CDS are finalising the coverage area and the rollout schedule which should be confirmed towards the end of June 2017. In the meantime, you may register your interest on the website https://www.gigaclear.com. This does not commit you to anything it just allows Gigaclear, who will be building the network, to keep you informed on progress with the rollout."

Neroche Parish Council is keeping a close eye on the progress and has sought further information from CDS but as yet has not received a reply. However, we will continue to chase Gigaclear and CDS for any information. We will include any updated information in the email alert distributed by Wally Torrington.

In the meantime, the parish council strongly urges anyone interested in fibre broadband to visit the Gigaclear website at: https://www.gigaclear.com and register your interest. When you access the site, simply enter your postcode where it says "Can I get Gigaclear", select your address and you will most likely be taken to a page showing "Progress in Buckland St Mary" with an update on progress (the CDS contracted areas are larger than the Parish boundary). Scroll down and you will see the button "Register your Interest".

We recommend that all households in the Parish register, so that Gigaclear will see a high potential take-up in the area, which in turn may influence (speed-up) the timescale for the provision of a fibre network.

PHASE 1 Update

Phase 1 Connecting Devon & Somerset (CDS) bid was won by BT but the large majority of Neroche Parish was one of the areas that unfortunately did not benefit from BT's fibre provision, presumably on the basis that we were not 'cost effective'. CDS put in place an interim 'voucher scheme', whereby any households that could not obtain broadband speeds greater that 2.5 bits were entitled to apply for £500 voucher to put towards the costs of an alternative provider.

The voucher scheme was well-publicised in the various parish publications. The voucher scheme closed on 30 November 2016 with just over 55% of households who successfully registered and obtained the CDS voucher. Many residents have since used the voucher to obtain fast broadband using one of the CDS registered providers, mostly Exmoor Technologies. The voucher is used to cover most of the installation costs of the router and aerial. Broadband is then purchased as required from one of the recommended mobile suppliers.

Due to the delay in finalising Phase 2 rollout plans, Connecting Devon & Somerset has agreed to extend the voucher expiry date to June 30 2017.

If anyone holds a voucher and wishes to install an interim solution please ensure that you register your request with your chosen provider as soon as soon as possible.
