


Alan has lived in Bickenhall since April 1997 and [was] volunteered to be editor of the Neroche Newsletter at the Annual Parish Meeting in 2011.


Occasionally, we also like to feature slightly more

The Neroche Annual Parish Meetings 2013

The Annual Parish Meetings of Neroche Parish was held in Neroche Hall on 16th May. It was both a pleasant social occasion and an important opportunity for residents to meet with Parish, Borough and County Councillors. It was a great success and very well attended, with around seventy residents present, which John Williams, Chairman of Taunton Deane Borough Council, said was exceptional for the area.

The social part of the evening occurred before and after the formal presentations. Members of local clubs and other groups, plus the church, the Parish Council, the Neroche Project and the WI set up a dozen stands to publicise their activities, and to invite residents to join their particular organisation. It also gave residents a chance to meet Councillors and to catch-up with friends. As they mingled, they were offered wine and cheese donated by Tesco's of Ilminster and Morrison's of Taunton respectively; coffee, tea and home made light refreshments, funded by the Parish Council, were available also, and served most professionally by the Women's Institute.

The formal part of the evening began with the Annual Parish Meetings of Bickenhall, Curland, Orchard Portman with Thurlbear, and Staple Fitzpaine,



which together form Neroche Parish. Jon Bell, Chair of the Council, presented his Annual Report. He detailed the undertakings of the Council and the problems the parish had faced. Progress had been made in obtaining a Traffic Speed Indicator for Staple Fitzpaine; an Affordable Housing Survey was under review, as was a Village Agent Scheme. The Neroche Parish Plan had lead to several thriving groups benefiting the parish, and he particularly thanked those

involved with the Litter Pick-Up Action Group, the Neroche Villages' Newsletter, the Thursday Lunch Club and the Walking Group. He sought volunteers to join those trained to help clear the footpaths and bridleways. The Council's response to severe flooding was discussed (more later). The Council had formed a sub-committee to advise on the budget and the precept (money collected from households for parish use); as a result, the Council was

building-up reserves to cover expenses, including the cost of parish council elections. The Women's Institute was thanked for catering for the event (which was certainly well deserved!).

Jon's presentation was followed by a lively discussion of issues raised by residents. One requested that strimming of footpaths be done sensitively so as not to threaten wildflowers. Others raised matters related to flooding, especially blocked ditches. We were advised that ditches, including those beside the road, were the landowner's responsibility. However, the County Council was responsible for slipways that allow water to flow from the roads into the ditches. In former times a man was employed to clear roadside ditches. This received support and led to an undertaking by the Parish Council to look into the possibility of employing someone, on a part time basis, to clear roadside ditches, using money raised from the precept.

Three invited speakers followed. David Fothergill spoke for the last time as our Somerset County Councillor, as recent boundary changes mean that he now represents another ward. As usual he spoke well, succinctly, and with humour, covering the topics of local flooding, broadband and the defibrillator project. The news about broadband was mixed; some local residents will benefit from the massive investment occurring at the moment but many will see little or no change. The user-friendly cardiac defibrillator is held at the Greyhound Inn (a report on this is in the



News Section of the Neroche Villages' website). David was warmly thanked for the help and assistance he has given to the parish.



John Williams, Chair of Taunton Deane Borough Council and our local Borough Councillor, spoke at length about the Taunton Deane Flood Alleviation Project, improvements to the A358, and parking in Taunton. The steps being taken to minimise flooding were very interesting. The residents expressed diverse opinions on several of the issues.

Gavin Saunders spoke briefly about developments affecting Neroche Forest. The Neroche Scheme is coming to an end but a new community based

enterprise has been formed, Neroche Woodlanders Ltd. It will work in partnership with the Forestry Commission, to generate sustainable produce and to create a better woodland environment. A key part is the Community Woodland Development at Young Wood near Winter Well and Badger Street (details of this can be found at www.youngwood.org.uk)

Unfortunately, the newly elected County Councillor, Ross Henley, could not attend, owing to another engagement.

The evening was certainly a success. The Annual Parish Meetings and presentations by the Borough and County Councillor's offered a real chance for residents to find out what was happening, to express their views and request for things to be done. The social side was great and the refreshments were appreciated.

Farm Sprayer Operator of the Year

Dou will be delighted to learn that we have a farming celebrity living in Neroche Parish. Graham Glasper, who works at Staple Farm, has won a prestigious award as one of the UK's top farm sprayer operators in the acclaimed Farm Sprayer Operator of the Year 2013 (FSOOTY) Awards, a nationwide competition sponsored by Syngenta.

Syngenta Area Business Manager, Duncan Woodward said "Graham has consistently shown outstanding skills and works to a very high standard, to achieve the best possible results. He has proved a worthy winner by demonstrating that best practice

can deliver efficient, cost effective and, above all, safe crop spraying".

In an article in Farmers Weekly, it stated:

"Christmas trees and miscanthus are two unusual crops that feature alongside combinable crops in the 285 hectares of cropping sprayed by Graham Glasper at Staple Farm near Taunton in Somerset. Spraying is completed with a 3,100 litre Farm Gem front and rear tank set-up.

Mr Glasper has been quick to see the potential benefits of recent developments in hand-held computing, and deploy them in his spraying operation.

The judges very much liked his use of a Patchwork spray monitor to implement electronic single entry spray recording. When exiting a field, the front mounted tank makes it potentially hazardous to passing traffic, so large convex mirrors have been fitted to the front of the machine to make the transition from field-to-road a safe one."

FSOOTY judge and Syngenta Application Specialist, Tom Robinson, said:

"Today's sprayers are capable of delivering incredible accuracy, with a wealth of new technology available. But it's down to the skills of the operators

working to very high standards to achieve the best possible results. FSOOTY focuses on all aspects of farm spraying to identify the very best operators across the UK, and to share their skills and expertise"

...and added:

"The FSOOTY Awards, now in its 28th year, has given due recognition to many of the UK's top operators, and also continually promotes the sharing of experience and best practice with all operators to raise the standard of spraying on farms. Syngenta recognises that the skills of the sprayer operator are paramount in achieving the best results from crop protection products,"

Many congratulations to Graham; give him a wave when you next see him working in the fields.

The Development of Castle Green


Much has been said and written about the historic centre of Taunton, the old Castle Green. It was a general and livestock market until around 1930, so was the public open space to which it has now reverted. The work that has been carried out has, I am delighted to say, been recognised nationally by various professional bodies for the quality of the design and workmanship. The wonderful glass bridge across the castle moat linking

Castle Green to Goodland's Gardens won top prize from Institute of Civil the Engineers for its design and construction Britannia Construction were nominated for the quality of their work on this heritage project and secured runner up position. Finally, the Architects heen have nominated for the outstanding merit of the



design and finish. A project for which I feel we can all be justly proud, having been recognised nationally for the quality of design and construction.

Shakespeare Festival



Talking of further events, an exciting project is coming up shortly on Castle Green. We have secured the first ever Shakespeare Festival in the wonderful setting of Castle Green, the historic heart of Taunton. Two of Shakespeare's best known plays, A Midsummer Night's Dream and The Merchant of Venice will each be performed twice between Thursday the 8th and Saturday the 10th August, with an outstanding cast of professional actors. This is a date for your diary; classical plays in a

truly historic setting!

Northern Inner Distributor Road

We have recently received the great news that funding for the Northern Inner Distributor Road (NIDR) has now finally been approved by Central Government. It was not an easy process but the availability of £15.2m of central funding, with the



balance of £7 million provided by Somerset County Council and developers' contributions, is an incredible boost to our local economy. It will be a major driver of our local economy with a £22 million contract starting imminently but it is truly the key to unlocking our major strategic employment site adjacent the main line railway station. This site has the potential for 4,000 jobs, 700 homes, and retail and leisure opportunities fronting the river. The NIDR is much more than just a new road through Taunton, it truly opens up a previously inaccessible major site for the new development planned.

Chairman's Report for the AGM of Aeroche Hall 11th June 2013.

As I prepare to write my report for this year's Annual General Meeting I am struck by how much we have achieved as a committee, not only in relation to the variety of events that have been promoted, but also the general improvements that have been made to the hall itself.



Over the past year, there have been several highlights and events worthy of a brief mention:

September's Hog Roast and Barn Dance was one of the most successful events of the last year.

Heritage Theatre's 'Lest we Forget' in November was a remembrance of both world wars portrayed by sounds and songs from the time.

December's **Christmas Fayre** offered a variety of gifts, arts and crafts.

January's **Jumble Sale** remains one of the Hall's biggest fund raisers.

With virtually a capacity attendance, Colin Croad's Fish and Chip Quiz Night once again tested the contestants' grey matter.

The 'Take Art' Amadou and Griselda production proved very popular with the audience.

The **Thursday Lunch Club** continues to be the most popular of facilities for the local community and is achieved by a band of volunteers who give of their own time and energy to this worthy project.

New Hall projects include:

The new **Pilates Class** being run on Wednesdays for a limited number of sessions. It's hoped that if it continues to be well supported it may become a regular feature.

The latest major project is 'Film Night', which is held on the last Friday in the month, and is operated by a company called Moviola. The committee were successful in obtaining a grant from the Lottery Fund to purchase new chairs and

blackout blinds/curtains. All future events will benefit from this long overdue purchase.

I am pleased to report that the Hall has retained the Hallmark One rating following the assessors visit last year. The hall has to be examined in a number of key areas to qualify for this rating and this achievement is testament to the committee's hard work and effort as well as being a mark of quality.

The maintenance of the hall, to preserve it for future generations, is the main aim of the Trustees and this naturally comes at a cost, hence the need for fund raising events. Major projects this past year have included the re-surfacing of the main hall and entrance lobby, the insulation and painting of a refurbished storeroom together with the purchase of new chairs as previously mentioned. A section of new wooden fencing has recently also been completed and funded due to a generous donation from the Gardening Club.

I would finally like to pay tribute to my fellow trustees and committee members, without whom none of the aforementioned would have been possible, for the help, guidance and friendship they have given me this past year. It is, as they say, all down to 'team work' but without a good team it just doesn't work - needless to say I have a 'good' team!

Our Secretary **Nicky Baxter** has maintained our minutes and agendas in her usual inimitable way, her husband **Chris** is also frequently to be found helping at events. Our Treasurer, **Anne Perry**, has again consistently managed to maintain our financial affairs. It would not all be possible without our experienced Booking Secretary, **Alison Brown**, whose diary never appears to leave her side. **Colin Croad** continues to be involved in many events including his valuable role as our quizmaster in chief and in the management of the 100 Club, which continues to be a popular fundraiser. **David Spears** has continued to be the committee's advisor on all matters electrical and technical and is currently looking to improve our sound system so that we can achieve a better quality of sound for our films currently shown by Moviola. **Sheila Green** has been involved with many of our events, anything involving food and drink seems to be her forte. **Graham Glasper** has provided the youth and muscle on the committee this past year especially when we are setting up for events or clearing down afterwards.

Finally, it is with regret that we will see **Tim French** leave the committee this year, after a long association with the hall, in order for him to pursue his other main interests within the Parish, borne out of the Parish Plan.

It is my hope that others will be encouraged to come forward and become involved with this valuable community resource as it is essential to maintain and ensure the hall's stability and future for subsequent generations.

Each Fish'n'Chips quiz normally attracts about 100 quizzers in 17 teams and raises over £400 towards

Neroche Hall funds. The last four quizzes have been won by four different teams; captained by John

Lee, Rob Larkman, Alan Perrior and Mike Quizmaster, Colin Croad, organises two quizzes per year, one in February and the other in October.



The average house price in Neroche Villages is approx £474,000 (according to the 'rightmove' website in early June 2013). Nationally, the average house price is less than £170,000.

3,000 vehicles per day use the road between Taunton Racecourse and The Greyhound Inn at Staple Fitzpaine. During the last 'Litter Pick-Up' in March 2013, 35 large bin bags of rubbish, along



with various car parts, dead animals and a wallet were collected along this stretch of road

The Neroche Herepath is a circular route of 13.5 miles, mostly through



forest tracks and green lanes, with Staple Fitzpaine at its centre. The Herepath Trail provides safe, off-road riding and walking in an area with spectacular views and scenery. It incorporates both new and existing public bridleways, which have been significantly improved, and new sections of permissive bridleway. The Herepath was officially opened on Saturday 10 May 2009 by local Paralympian Debbie Criddle. Herepaths, often known as

'Snippets"

People's Paths, were originally important trade and communication routes between settlements during the ninth century.

Lib Dem Ross Henley won the recent Somerset County Council election for the Blackdown & Neroche electoral division, with 1,035 votes. A total of 2,895 votes were cast, which represents approximately a 37% turnout from an electorate of 7,893.





The Thursday Lunch Club started in March 2011 and usually caters for about 40 people, including 8-10 helpers. There are two vegetarian regulars at the lunches, the catering team try to cater for special dietary needs if informed beforehand. As well as donating surplus funds to the

Church, the Hall, British Legion & other worthy causes, the lunch club also has a collecting box for Open Door, the charity that feeds & cares for the homeless in Taunton. £300 was donated to Open Door last Christmas.





In June, local Domestic Central Heating Oil prices returned to the same as a year ago; ie, 55p per litre. The price peaked at 66p per litre in April 2013.

Home Deliveries to Neroche Households



Some ince the early 1970s, a small local enterprise has been making home deliveries to Neroche residents; for the past 9 years it has been owned and run by Keith Bailey and Rachel Down. They operate two full-time vans and deliver all dairy products, potatoes, eggs and newspapers. There is no extra cost in having an order brought to-your-door, other than a

small delivery charge for newspapers.

Seven-days-a-week, in the early hours of the morning, Keith and Rachel collect their daily stock from Taunton, and aim to deliver to the Neroche Parish area between

5.00am and 7.00am. They have never failed to show, even during floods and heavy snow storms. However, in recent years, the number of customers using the services of Keith and Rachel has declined and has brought into

question the economic viability of continuing with the business.

Neroche Local History Group - Recent Aleetings

<u>In our first meeting of 2013</u>, Peter Darch, now living in Devon, spoke of his training as a forester in Neroche Forest, between June 1961 and March 1962. He arrived here at the age of 16, from Bristol, and lived with Mary and Harry Weaver in a cottage beyond Underhill Farm most of the time he was here. He was trained by Mr. James Fowler, the area's head forester who lived in Forest

Lodge Staple Fitzpaine. Peter described his fellow foresters as "a lovely bunch of men". The work in the forest was hard but the foresters worked as a team and it was enjoyable. Some had special skills such as great ability with an axe. He recalled "never washing very much. We must have been very sweaty and smelly, but we were all like it".



In March, Mrs. Celia Fitzhugh of North Curry gave us



a well-illustrated talk about her village, where an enthusiastic group of local historians have amassed a considerable amount of material. Much to our envy they have their own archive room above The Pavement Café in the village where they can work and store archives safely. There is a strong link between North Curry and Curland as they hold the archive photos of Curland Methodist Chapel, which closed at the turn of the 20th and 21st, century and worshippers now attend North Curry Methodist Chapel. We were pleased to help the historians there by naming

many of the people in photos taken as far back as the 1930s.

Celia described the background to the building of the attractive Queen's Square in the village and also described the many industries, some connected with the willow growing in the area. We also learnt about the numerous shops that were in the village until quite recently. At one time they had "The Bijou Cinema", (affectionately referred to by local people as "The Bye Joe Cinema") where films could be seen for a few pence.

At our third meeting, in May, we, and many guests, enjoyed a performance of



"Two Nations", given by Time and Tide, an excellent local amateur company. The title of their production was taken from Benjamin Disraeli's book "Sybil: or, The Two Nations" when he exposed the wealth of some of the population and the extreme poverty of the poor. This was particularly so in the counties of the

south-west of England. Drawing on the observations of writers like Cobbett, Blake, Hardy and Barnes and folk songs of Dorset and Somerset, they explored

"what others did not see, heard what others did not hear, and understood what others did not wish to know...". The three men and two women in the company sang and played well and it was very entertaining, but also thought provoking. Some in the audience



were heard to say that it wasn't so different right through to the 1930s, and as



a local history group, we were conscious of the fact that they were singing about conditions we had explored in our own recent investigations in our villages.

As a local history group, we have two current projects:

a] we are hoping to put on a map the location of cottages and buildings that have disappeared. If anyone knows of any we would be very pleased to hear about them.

b] we also want to list the names of residents of the villages of Bickenhall, Curland and Staple Fitzpaine who lived here in the mid-20th century. The beginning of the century is easy to record because we can rely on the census material of 1901 and 1911 (which are available online), but for 1950 say, we have to rely on the memories of local people. Curland and Staple Fitzpaine records are nearly complete but we have much work to do for Bickenhall.

Welcome to the third in a series of articles produced by our Clerk to the Parish Council, Howard Midworth. This contribution looks at the question "What is Localism?".

WHAT IS LOCALISM?

Localism is the phrase for a policy initiative from Government to try and ensure that decisions are made as close as practical to a local community that is affected, and aims to push decision making down to the most local level, wherever possible.



There are also a number of concepts which you may have seen or heard in the media, which are defined by the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) as:

The Big Society - the vision of a society where people, neighbourhoods and communities have more power and responsibility, and use it to create better services and outcomes.

Decentralisation - the process of giving away power to individuals, professionals, communities and local institutions.

Localism - the ethos of doing everything at the lowest possible level and only involving central government if absolutely necessary.

The aims flowing from these concepts are:

- Communities and town and parish councils could use local knowledge to provide better tailored local services
- Central government is an enabler: informing, enthusing, networking and supporting

- Shifting power from central Whitehall to local public servants, from bureaucrats to local communities and individuals
- Helping people and their locally elected representatives to achieve their own ambitions
- Giving local authorities the formal legal ability and greater confidence to respond to what local people want
- Making it easier for local people to take over amenities they value and keep them part of local life
- Ensuring local community groups with ideas for improving local services get a chance to change how things are done
- Giving people a new way to voice opinions on local issues

The ways in which these aims can be achieved is through a number of new community rights, including:

- *Community right to buy* the ability to list public and private land & buildings as assets of community value.
- *Community right to challenge* parish councils can express an interest in taking over running a local authority service.
- *Community right to build* local communities can take forward their own plans for development without the need for a conventional planning application.
- Neighbourhood Plans communities can have greater influence in deciding where facilities and housing should go through local referendum.

The Government enshrined these various community rights in the Localism Act 2011, which gives Town and Parish Councils certain powers should they wish to take advantage of them.

Whilst Parish Councils can now adopt powers to undertake a much wider variety

of activities, the major question, as always, is how they will be funded and by whom. Taking on new projects and delivering services can generally only be funded through the parish precept or Council Tax charge, therefore the key question for both Local Councils and communities is whether the community is prepared to pay an extra amount on its Council Tax bills in exchange for services that the local community would find useful. The Council would then have to decide whether it had the capacity or resources to undertake the activity.

Ultimately, the community is able to decide how much it may be prepared to pay for what level of local services.



The One and Only Pub in Neroche Villages The Greyhound Inn at Staple Fitzpaine



The Greyhound Inn is Grade II listed and was originally a 16th century Coaching Inn. Overlooking the church and within easy reach of Taunton it has since been extended into a series of rambling, interconnecting bars and function rooms with a rustic mix of flagstone floors, exposed timber beams, open fires and natural stone walls

The landlords, David and Marina Wright, have been at the pub for over 6 years but have more than 20 years experience in running wine bars, restaurants and pubs, most recently in the Devon and Dorset area.

The pub has built up a reputation for the quality of its food and is kept busy catering for locals, passing trade and customers from Taunton and beyond. It is especially busy on those days when local sporting events are taking place at the Polo ground, Taunton racecourse or Somerset County Cricket Club.

David & Marina are proud that all the food is homemade and freshly prepared with locally sourced ingredients whenever possible. The meat is supplied by Riverside Butchers of Taunton, the fish comes fresh from Phil Bowditch of Brixham and the desserts are supplied by a local patisserie.

As well as looking after the normal pub trade, David & Marina support and provide facilities for local clubs and organisations such as the WI, local skittles team, Polo Club and Local Action Groups, including the newsletter team and can cater for functions such as wedding and christening parties.

And, if that wasn't enough, they even look after the Automated External Defibrillator which was installed at the pub last year. Thankfully, it hasn't been required yet but 3 of the pub staff have been fully trained in its use.



Finally, when you next visit the Greyhound, don't worry too much about the resident ghost. The Grey Lady hasn't been seen for 2 years – or rather, no one admits to seeing her recently!
